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
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I don't know about March winds but boy, didn't we have some hooligans in February. Still no rain - please save every drop you can - enough said!!!!

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National Parks in Spain

Spain boasts 15 national parks distributed on the peninsula and the two archipelagos. In March, Nina started our journey to visit them all and so our travels continue



Parque Nacional de Monfragüe was declared a Natural Park in 1979, Extremadura's first protected area. It had a surface area of 18.396 hectares.

It boasts Europe's largest and best-preserved single expanse of Mediterranean wilderness and scrubland. This fact occasioned the status of the park to be augmented to National Park in 2007, the highest level of protection of a natural space in Spain.



The rich and unique fauna in Monfragüe, the many different plant formations, and the spectacular landscape with its geomorphological value all contribute to the outstanding natural and cultural heritage of this corner of Extremadura.

Furthermore, the enormous extensions of shrub and grassland, the river Tagus, the hillsides covered in virtually impenetrable brush, and several animal species in danger of extinction have turned Monfragüe into one of the treasures of European nature, and one of its last virgin ecosystems.

Monfragüe is a very good example of what is called Appalachian relief – a phenomenon named after the native American Apalachee tribe which lived in a similar geological environment.

This relief is typical of old siliceous materials, and it consists of alternating layers of hard, resistant rock such as quartz and sandstone, and slate which is fragile. The hardest rocks constitute the mountainous areas, and the softer rocks are found in the valley, moulded by the waterways.

In 2003, Monfragúe was recognised by the UNESCO as Biosphere Reserve, an international honorary title which vouches for the





unique value of the area. At the same time, a total surface area of more than 100,000 hectares was denominated Special Protection Area (SPA) for birds under the name of 'Monfrague and Surrounding Meadows'.

The rich fauna of the park is dominated by bird species, and thousands of national and international visitors travel there every year in order to observe some of the bird species that are difficult or impossible to observe in other parts of Spain and the world. In Monfragúe most of them can be observed fairly close up from the main road.


But the undisputed no. 1 place for bird observation is Salto del Gitano, a lookout point at the top of a 300m tall rock, at the bottom of which the river Tagus flows by. This is a place of reference for ornithologists from near and far, as well as other visitors, who all come to enjoy the

sight of vultures, eagles, and other birds of prey flying overhead.

At the end of September, the visitor to the Monfragüe National Park will hear the deep sound of the stags' bellowing. This is one of the few opportunities to see the large males in the wild. When the first rains start falling, the males, who have been spending the summer in the thickets on the mountains, move down to the meadows where the females roam.







equally strong males meet, a spectacular fight with clashing antlers ensues. The winner gets to mate with the females. In May, after eight months' gestation, the fawns are born.

Other animal species that have made the park their home include civet cats, badgers, lynxes, mountain cats, otters, snakes, and turtles.

Since time immemorial, the Tagus and Tiétar rivers together with the surrounding mountains have offered many incentives for man to settle in the area: Water, fishing, game, and a forest bursting with fruit and berries. These things make it the ideal place to live.

The first settlers left their imprints in the caves they used for storage and shelter, and prehistoric cave paintings representing humans and animals are exhibited in the Centre de Arte Rupestre de Monfragüe.

Throughout history various cultures have taken root in these lands. The Romans coined the name of the park: Monsfragorum, rugged mountain, alluding to the richness and exuberance of the landscape.

Under Muslim rule, the area was called 'Al Mofrag', meaning 'the abysm' or 'the crossroads'.

The Muslims built a fortress by the same name at the beginning of the 9th century, and it is practically the roof of the park. Its purpose was to defend the crossing points over the Tagus river, and it is full of history and legends, and it offers stunning views over the Monfragüe National Park.

During the re-conquest, the fortress fell into Christian hands, and in the 15th century it was extended, and the 'Homage Tower' was added. It is still standing today, and for centuries it kept serving as a defence structure, protecting the border between Extremadura and Castilla y León.

The fortress was part of a network of defence structures built in the mountains at high altitudes to defend and protect the land against invaders and criminals, until it was destroyed during the Independence War.

Next to the Homage Tower is the Virgin of Monfrague who was brought back from Palestine by the Knights Templar hundreds of years ago. She's still standing in spite of the passing of the centuries.



From the top of the tower, you see the river and the park in bird's eye views. It is one of the most impressive observation points in the park, and it offers unforgettable views any time of the year. From the clear sky above and the great Tagus river at your feet to kilometres of green meadows and scrubland spread out in front of you, and the birds flying above the fortress on their way to and from Salto del Gitano.

In 1990, the administration of the park started a new project for more public access and environmental education. The village of Villarreal de San Carlos was at that time in ruins. The park administration bought the houses and outbuildings, and they were restored to accommodate the ever-increasing number of visitors to the park.

Every year, more than 450,000 visitors flock to the park to enjoy the stunning views and the varied and impressive fauna.

Broccoli A Bouquet of Benefits!



Going through the fruits and vegetables I've done in this column over the years, I suddenly realised I've never done broccoli! What a dreadful omission, and I sincerely ask for your forgiveness.

I shall make up for it forthwith!

Broccoli is very good for you, tasty, available all year round and reasonably priced. What more can you ask!

This beautiful green vegetable is bursting with health benefits: it is filling, helps your digestion, intestinal flora, immune system, cells, and red blood cells.

Full of dietary fibre, broccoli is one of the vegetables that gives you a feeling of satiation for the longest time. The longer you chew the little florets, the more satiation signals are sent to your brain.

The dietary fibre also does a lot of good in your intestine where it stimulates the rhythmic movements and literally kickstarts your bowel movements. Thus, they keep your digestion going and prevent constipation.

And that's not everything! The dietary fibre furthermore nourishes and increases the healthy intestinal bacteria. In later years, researchers have paid much attention to intestinal bacteria as they are thought to be important for your general health. The more healthy intestinal bacteria the better, so don't hold back on eating broccoli!

Broccoli is a great source of vitamin C, which benefits your system immensely: Both articulations, tendons, muscles, bones, and skin

enjoy improved health from the ingestion of vitamin C. And of course, it boosts your immune system.

And to top it off, broccoli is one of the best vegetable sources of folate, or folic acid (vitamin B9). Folate stimulates the formation of new cells, red blood cells, and the processing of protein.

The best way of maximising the benefits of broccoli is eating it raw, as both folate and vitamin C may disappear when warmed up. If you aren't a great fan of raw broccoli, prepare it as gently as you can. Cooked broccoli is far better than no broccoli!

It is very easy to see whether a head of broccoli is fresh or not when you buy it (or come to use it), as the top starts turning yellow when it approaches its 'best before date'. Do not buy broccoli that is turning yellow, but if you've got it in the fridge at home anyway, cook and eat it quickly. It's perfectly edible, and you want to avoid wasting food.

When you get your broccoli home, cut off the bottom of the stem and wrap it in a bit of wet kitchen roll before placing it in the fridge in a sealed plastic bag.

Use broccoli raw in salads, or steamed, stir fried, or roasted in the oven. You cannot go wrong with broccoli!

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
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Spring Into March!

The way things are going, spring will probably feel like summer, so I daren't even start to imagine what the real summer will be like.

Q.: What do ducks, salmons, cows, and pigs have in common?

A.: They all feature in Cooking with Me this springy month of March!

Each in its own scrummy recipe – I'm really treating you this month. And introducing you to a new culinary delight: Krebinetter! Well, not new in Denmark, but I've never done them here. Interested? Read, cook, and enjoy!

Killer Sauce (with Salmon)

I know we don't usually have the sauce as the protagonist of recipes, but truth is that lovely as salmon is, this recipe does not revolve around it.

I did nothing special with it, just sprinkled it with salt, pepper, and lemon juice and fried it in a drop of olive oil.

But the sauce... A culinary masterpiece, though very quick and simple. And it lends itself to any fish or meat!

Try it and rejoice!

Ingredients for two:

15g butter

½ vegetable stock pot (those little jelly stock thingies)

100g mushrooms, sliced

50g red onion in thinnish wedges

50g baby spinach leaves

150ml cream

Salt, pepper, and lemon juice

Melt the butter and jelly stock in a frying pan until golden. Throw in the mushrooms and cook, stirring, until they are quite brown. Add the red onion and cook for another minute before adding the spinach. Cook until it starts withering.

Pour over the cream and let it bubble gently until it has the desired consistency. If it gets too thick, add a little water - I used pasta

Season to taste and serve with whatever you have planned.

I had mine with salmon and pasta, it was amazing, and I can't wait to try it with something else!



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































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Duck's Breast with Stir Fry

What a lovely idea: Duck's breast marinated in orange, soy sauce, ginger and maple syrup! A real treat!

And the marinade from the duck gives a fresh and unusual flavour to the stir-fried vegetables and noodles.

I always break noodles into pieces before cooking them as that makes it much easier to mix them with the vegetables.

Ingredients for two:

- 1 duck's breast, skin and fat scored in a diamond pattern
- 25g ginger, grated
- 2 tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tbsp maple syrup (or honey)
- 1 orange, grated rind of
- Salt and pepper
- 2 tbsp oil

250g egg noodles, broken into smaller pieces and cooked as per instructions on packet

- 2 carrots, cut into matchsticks
- 1 leek, cut into thin strips lengthwise
- 1 red pepper, cut into thin strips
- Soy sauce and pepper

Mix together the ginger, soy sauce, syrup, and honey. Turn the duck's breast in the marinade to cover all over, then cover and set aside. Go back and turn it in the marinade from time to time.

Leave it for at least half an hour.

Preheat the oven to 200°C. Drain the marinade from the duck and reserve it. Place the duck in a small, greased roasting tin, sprinkle it with salt and pepper and roast it in the oven for 25 minutes until the skin is golden and crisp and the meat still pink in the middle.

In the meantime, prepare your noodles and vegetables. When the meat is done, take it out of the oven and keep it warm.

Heat the oil in a wok or large, deep pan, and add the carrot sticks. Cook for a minute, add the pepper and cook for 30 seconds, then the leeks for another minute or so – stirring all the time.

Throw in the cooked noodles and fry and stir until they take a little colour. Pour in the reserved marinade, stir, making sure everything is heated through. Season to taste with soy sauce and black pepper.

Slice the duck and serve it with the stir fry.

An amazing blend of flavours!





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
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Krebinetter (Breaded Pork Patties)







I suddenly realised the other day that I've never introduced you to krebinetter!

You poor, poor people, and what a nasty person that makes me.

Let me make amends immediately!

Krebinetter are Danish breaded minced pork patties, and they are

Traditionally they are served with boiled potatoes, a selection of steamed vegetables (such as carrots, cauliflower, leeks etc.), and

When I decided to make mine, I took the opportunity to use up some vegetable leftovers which I roasted in the oven. I also had a rest of gravy and some mushrooms, so I quickly browned the mushrooms in a pan, poured over the gravy and heated it through.

I know it looks like a bit of a mess, and I suppose it was with me using only leftovers, but I can assure you that it was delicious.

However, if you want to make it with the traditional side dish, at least the first time, I recommend the above-mentioned vegetables.

Krebinetter for two:

300g minced pork

1 egg, whisked

2 tbsp dried breadcrumbs

Salt and pepper

Pinch of paprika

Butter and oil

Divide the meat into four equally large portions and shape them firmly into balls. Place them on a chopping board and gently flatten them to make them into patties.

Mix the breadcrumbs with the salt, pepper, and paprika.

Turn a patty in the egg making sure it is coated all over, then turn it in the breadcrumbs, pressing gently to make sure they stick. Repeat with the others.

Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan until the butter turns golden. Put the patties in the pan and let them brown at a good heat for a minute or two. Turn them over, fry for another couple of minutes, then turn the heat down to medium-low.

Fry the patties for five minutes more on each side and keep them warm until you serve them.

I can never manage both mine in one sitting, but no problem, they are wonderful warmed up for another meal, or cold in a sandwich!

Welcome to the Krebinet Fanciers' Club!



As you may have noticed over the years – I'm mad about osso buco!! I also love beetroots, so as you can imagine, when I saw this recipe in a Danish magazine, I just had to make it.

And I did, and it was GREAT! I cooked it on that very windy Saturday in February, just the kind of day for slow cooking to make your kitchen warm and cosy.

Osso buco is undeniably heavy, rich meat, and a fresh gremolata always goes a treat with it.

I'll give you the full recipe for four – I don't know anyone except myself who would go to the trouble to cook something like this just for themselves.

Ingredients for four:

4 slices of beef shank (osso buco)

Salt and pepper

3 tbsp olive oil

2-3 red onions, cut into thick wedges

3-4 cloves garlic, thinly sliced

800g beetroots, cut into thick wedges

400g carrots, cut into thick sticks

3 tbsp plain flour

500ml dark beer (stout)

1-2 tsp dried thyme

3 bay leaves

Drop of lemon juice (optional)

Gremolata:

1 bunch flat leaved parsley, finely chopped

1 lemon, grated rind of

2-3 cloves garlic, finely chopped

First of all, mix the ingredients to the gremolata and put it in the fridge in an airtight container.

Make a few cuts round the edges of the meat slices to stop them from curling up. Season them on both sides with salt and pepper.

Heat the oil in a large casserole dish and brown off the meat in the oil. You may need to do in batches depending on the size of the slices. Set aside.

In the same dish, cook the vegetables at medium heat for 4-5 minutes. Sprinkle the flour over the vegetables and mix well. Pour in the beer and loosen the sediment off the bottom while you bring the beer to the boil. Add the thyme, bay leaves, salt, and pepper and stir well.

Return the meat to the dish and cover. Leave it to bubble gently either on the stove or in a low oven for 2-2½ hours until the meat is completely tender.

Adjust the seasoning and add a drop of lemon juice if you feel the

Serve with the gremolata sprinkled over the top and crusty bread or, like me, oven baked potatoes in cream. A sure winner!!



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Caravaca De la Cruz & the Wine Horses

From the 1st to 5th May, Caravaca De la Cruz dresses up to enjoy its festival in honour of the Santísima y Vera Cruz de Caravaca. A main part of this festivity is the outstanding celebration of Wine Horses that takes place during the two first days. This has been declared of International Tourist Interest.



As well as the horses there are parades, battles of Moors and Christians and religious events, such as the Bathing of the Cross.

The history of this unique fiesta centres around the extraordinary story of the Vera Cruz (True Cross). This fragment of wood is said to have been part of the cross upon which Jesus was crucified and it has protected the city since the 13th century.

The presence of the Vera Cruz in Caravaca is the reason for its status as a Holy City, one of only 5 in the world, on par with Rome, Jerusalem and Santiago de Compostela.

The legend dates back to the days of the Knights Templar, who had to seek refuge in the castle with the townsfolk because they were besieged by the Muslim armies. At one point the water supply became contaminated, people were becoming sick and dying of thirst, so the Knights were forced to leave the castle to look for fresh supplies. They couldn't find any water, but they did find flagons of wine! These were tied onto their horses and without delay raced back up the hill to the castle before the Moorish armies realised what was happening, bringing the precious liquid to the townspeople.

The wine was first blessed in the presence of the Vera Cruz, which was then bathed in the wine and when this was given to the people miraculously the sick and wounded were healed, and the contaminated water became drinkable!

On 2nd May each year, to commemorate this happening, 60 horses are dressed in spectacular embroidered cloaks and run up the hill to the sanctuary one by one, in a race against the clock. Four young men have to run together with each horse without ever releasing their hold so as not to be disqualified.

It can be extremely exciting and dangerous, as the streets are packed with onlookers who part to allow the horses to rush past just centimetres away!

Prizes are awarded for both the fastest horses and those with the most exceptional embroidered outfits.

The cloaks and hoods have all been embroidered by hand, often using gold thread, by members of the Peña (a group of family/friends), who work tirelessly all year to prepare for this special occasion.

The Spectacular Easter Celebrations of Lorca



One of the most spectacular Easter celebrations in all of Spain is in fact right on our door step: in Lorca.

The Easter processions in Lorca were declared of International Tourist Interest in 2007 by the General Secretariat of Tourism of the Ministry of Industry, Tourism and Trade of the Government of Spain.

Furthermore, some of the costumes embroidered by hand in gold and silk, depicting important events in the life of the personages who wear them, are the first fabrics to ever have been declared Assets of Cultural Interest.

This fiesta is also known as 'Blancos y Azules' (Whites and the Blues), referring to two of the brotherhoods of Lorca. Although there are other fraternities in Lorca, these two are the most important and there is a clear rivalry between them to put on the most spectacular and colourful show.

The main processions are on the Friday before Palm Sunday, Palm Sunday itself, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

The processions on the two first days are more religious than biblical, in other words not as spectacular and with fewer horses and chariots.

Maundy Thursday and Good Friday evenings see the event of the two main processions of the whole Lorca Easter Week.

The grand processions take place in what is known as 'La Carrera'. There are people dressed as Roman emperors, Egyptian troops, Roman gods in heavy carriages, chariots and on horseback, and sculptures of virgins with rich embroidered robes, luxurious standards, and so on. The standard of the 'Prayer in the Garden' (white), better known as 'the floral cloth', is noteworthy.

The most highly anticipated floats include Cleopatra, carried on the shoulders of Egyptian troops, or the Antichrist, with its demonic appearance. There are also chariot races. On Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, the town is a splash of colour, gold and sliver in a Baroque procession where the Brotherhoods (white and blue) try to outdo each other. The Whites gather round the Virgin of the Affliction, while the patron saint of the Blues is the Virgin of the Suffering.

Easter week is one of the most spectacular and emotional fiestas in Lorca. Religious devotion, art, colour and music combine in acts to commemorate the death of Jesus Christ. Members of the different Easter brotherhoods, dressed in their characteristic robes, parade through the streets carrying religious statues to the sound of drums and music – scenes of sober beauty intermingled with spectacular processions. Lorca at Easter is well worth a visit.





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

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Fun in the sun

Last month the Almanazora Group of Friends went on a day trip to the Sierra Nevada ski resort and the Nevada Shopping complex in Granada.

The idea was so popular that two coaches were needed to cover the demand, and a total of 108 members happily set off at 8 o'clock in the morning.

After a 30-minute break in Guadix, the group arrived at the ski resort just after midday.

Today the resort is a thriving centre of activity, but over a hundred years ago it was just an isolated area in the

Sierra Nevada ranges. It is said that the idea of building the resort was the brainchild of the then Spanish consul in Helsinki, Angel Ganivet who hailed from Granada. Living in a snow covered skiing mad country like Finland inspired the diplomat to suggest that a resort be developed in the mountains near his hometown, Granada, so that people there could enjoy similar activities.

Skiing started in Sierra Nevada n 1912 when the first

mountain refuge had been built. Already in 1914 Spain's National Sports Week was held there, and since then many national and international events have taken place in the resort, the latest in 2023: the Snowboard Cross World Cup.

The ski slopes are on the northwestern side of Veleta, the third highest peak on the Peninsula. It is Europe's southernmost ski resort.

The season normally runs from December to May, and last year more than a million tourists visited, 80% of them skiers.

Sierra Nevada ski resort is serviced by two gondolas which run from the lower area. This area, which is at 2,100 metres, is where the restaurants, shops and hotels are located. The gondolas go up to the mid station, Borreguiles, at 2,675 metres. In addition to the gondolas there are 22 lifts which service the 105 kilometres of alpine ski runs.

The visitors from the Group of Friends had two and a half hours at the resort. Many explored the lower area where the shops and restaurants are, whilst the more intrepid members rode the gondola to the mid station where all the action was.



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were skiers and snowboarders everywhere, painting a lovely picture in their colourful ski gear against the backdrop of the white snow and blue sky. It was warm on the slopes with the sun shining from a clear sky.

The organiser of the trip had chosen the perfect day for the outing.

At 2.30 the coaches set off for the Nevada Shopping complex. The scenery on the descent from the ski resort to Granada was spectacular, only marred by one unnerving sight, that of pine trees covered in what looked like snow,

but turned out to be processionary caterpillars' nests, ready to hatch by the look of them.

The coaches arrived at the mall at about three, and the group had two hours for lunch and shopping. Most, it seemed, concentrated

The mall was first opened in November 2016. It is Andalucia's largest commercial centre, and one of the largest in Europe.

It covers an area of 266,986 m2 and houses 280 shops and 40 restaurants. There is parking for 6,000 cars. For shopping addicts this facility must seem like Heaven.

The coaches departed for home just after 5 pm with over a hundred tired, but happy, campers. They made a quick stop at Guadix, and most people were home by 8.15.

It was a fantastic day out!

Black Vulture

The black vulture (also known as the cinereous vulture) is Spain's largest bird of prey. With its unmistakable silhouette, it soars in complete silence above the large Mediterranean forests of southwestern Spain. This majestic bird, together with the griffon vulture, the Egyptian vulture, and the bearded vulture constitute the few species of vulture living in Europe.

It is one of the world's largest birds, but it is not only its size that stands out. As opposed to other species of vulture, it does not make a sound as it soars across the sky.

This large bird is easily identified thanks to its wingspan. Its wings are wide and can span over three metres, somewhat more than the griffon vulture.

The black vulture planes rather than flies, and only very rarely flaps its wings. When it is on the lookout for prey, it soars across the sky in complete silence moving its head from one side to another. When it catches sight of carrion on the ground, it folds its wings and launches itself downwards, generating a buzzing sound.

In spite of its name, the black vulture is in fact dark brown. Its neck and part of its head are bare, whereas its face and the top of its head are covered with very dark

down. At the base of the neck, it has a collar of short, pale feathers.

The black vulture usually lives in ravines with dense vegetation, preferably in pine, cork oak, or holly oak trees. Apart from



population of some 100 specimens living in a colony that was establish centuries ago, and today it is the only island population of black vultures in the world.

Flying at lower altitudes than other vultures, the black vulture is able to spot small carrion that other vultures miss. Rabbit is a great

One of the characteristics of its eating habits is that is prefers muscle to the viscera as opposed to other species of vulture. Furthermore, it is able to catch some live animals such as squirrels, lizards, and tortoises, as remains found in some nests bear witness to.

Black vultures do not reproduce every year. But when they do, the incubation starts in March. Both parents participate in this task which takes 55 days. In early May a single chick is hatched. The parents take the incubation very seriously and experts say that it takes a lot to make a sitting black vulture leave its nest.

The plumage of the young is black. They stay with their parents for about three months. They reach sexual maturity at 5-6 years of age.

The black vulture has a life expectancy of some 20 years, although some specimens have lived to over 35.







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GOING GREEN

Urban greenspace – an oasis in the heat island

I read an article recently about a series of protests in Madrid over the local council's tree-felling, in what

has been a long running saga. The whole thing seemed so counter-intuitive. Why would an urban locality want to lose valuable 'green' in their environment? It turns out that the local communities do not, but the local council is keen to press on with the plan to extend the city's metro system. The issue though, losing trees from urban areas, goes further than Madrid, which I will return to later in the article. It is about the inclusion and maintenance of 'green infrastructure' in cities or other urban areas.

The cooling benefits of water and foliage have been a feature of the design of settlements in hot climates since time immemorial. The ancient Egyptians, Persians and Chinese amongst many other civilisations put considerable efforts into creating green spaces, often with water features.

A trip to Sevilla and the Jardines de las Real Alcázares will provide you with possibly the greatest example of a late-medieval garden in Spain. The influence of the Moors, present in the city from the 8th Century AD, is highly visible. As well as the Real Alcázares, there are several other gardens spread around. In Islamic societies, the planned urban garden concept was dual-purposed, to give a vision of heaven on earth and to provide a respite from the severe heat of North Africa, Southern Europe and the Middle East. The evaporation of water and the shade provided by the trees and other plants offered the means to keep cooler, and the design of buildings with small windows around a planted courtyard remains a winning design in that respect.

Fast forward to the 1930's and an early version of air conditioning (AC) was developed. It was very expensive at first, but really took off in the 1960s. Being able to avoid the searing temperatures and, in some locations, sticky high humidity, at the flick of a switch proved to be a gamechanger and AC spread around the world. It is one of those cruel ironies that the power used to keep us pleasantly comfortable when working or sleeping, contributes about 4% per year of global greenhouse gas emissions. That may not seem like much at first glance, but it is double the rate of global aviation.

The modern city, as a maze of hard surfaces with towering buildings of concrete, glass and steel, and kept comfortable inside with AC,



does not offer much scope to accommodate green spaces, and is hotter outside as a result. Modern, 20th century, city design has resulted in the unintended consequence of what are termed urban heat islands (UHI). An UHI is created as a result of the reflective and heat storing capabilities of the building materials. It means that cities are around 3-4°C higher than the surrounding countryside. Pavements and roads can reach temperatures way in excess of the actual air temperature and, just like a domestic storage heater, retain that heat as a reservoir that slowly dissipates later. Often, as seasoned city travellers may have experienced, the temperatures stay high even at night. One consequence of this is that more energy is then consumed in AC, which keeps the cycle of warming ticking

At the extreme is Phoenix, in the USA, where last summer it posted an unwelcome record of 31 days with temperatures at or above 43.3°C (110F) and, a 16-day period where temperatures did not drop below 32.2°C (90F) at night. Usurpingly this had a dramatic effect, especially on those people without homes, who literally had no escape from the heat. The city was forced to open cooling stations and offered means to rehydrate its citizens, although there were several fatalities. It is planning to adopt a more natural solution, and to that end is halfway through an ambitious project to shade at least 25% of the city with a tree canopy by 2030.

It has been anecdotally stated for years that green spaces in cities have benefits. Academics at the University of Surrey punished research in February quantifying that assumption. Their research revealed that wetlands, parks and botanical gardens have a significant effect in cooling cities (www. surrey.ac.uk/global-centre-clean-air-research, if you want to have a look). Botanical gardens showed the greatest average decrease in temperature at 5°C, and street trees, although marginally less effective were still able to register an average 3.8°C drop. Having spent time in Murcia (the city, that is) last summer, I was glad of that momentary cooling, even if I wasn't entirely sure how much it was helping and precisely why! The study also found that the bigger the greenspaces, to a point, the more effective the cooling impact would be, with the hottest areas having the least greenspace, and the coolest the most.

Aside from providing welcome shade, urban greenspaces, with or without water features, provide cities with natural means to be more resilient to flooding, as the trees and

vegetation soak up excess water than cannot penetrate hard surfaces. They also provide wildlife habitats and sometimes corridors for birds, bats and pollinators, which gives a helping hand to a bit of natural wonder to liven up the concrete. As well, greenery removes carbon from the atmosphere and trees, in particular, play a vital function in absorbing airborne pollutants, helping to contribute to improved urban air quality.

City planners are not always on the same page however, as the kerfuffle in Madrid is currently demonstrating. A plan in February 2023 was to see over 1000 trees cut down, partly to make way for an expanded metro line. A hard-fought campaign involving local





residents and environmental groups including Ecologistas en Acción, drew concessions from the PP-dominated administration to the extent that the number of trees to be felled was cut in half. That is still a net loss of 500 mature trees though! The February flare-up occurred as the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Paseo del Prado and Buen Retiro is under threat from the chainsaws. The issue, as is often the case in matters to do with town planning and development, one of consultation or consideration of alternatives. Given that the UHI impact in Madrid ranks as one of the top six worldwide, assessed at an average of 8.5°C hotter than its surrounding countryside by the sustainability consultants ARUP, there must be a case to determine a better approach.

So significant is the strength of feeling, it prompted a European Parliamentary question to the EU Commission in December. The basis was what the Commission thought of the threat to the EU's climate targets and what it felt the impact of the loss of the trees would be on the quality of Madrid's urban environment. The Commission's response, that it was a matter for the Spanish authorities, precludes any EU intervention in the near future, but it will serve to keep the authorities on their toes, which is all we can ever really do as citizens – try to make power accountable.

It is not only a Madrid problem though. Across Europe there have been many such instances. In the UK Sheffield Council contracted out maintenance of the city's trees to a private contractor, which felt it was more economic to cut them down. Cue city-wide protests, disruption and ultimately jail time for some of the protestors. The programme was in the end halted, but hundreds of mature (and loved) urban trees were lost. More recently Plymouth made the news when the, then - he was forced to resign over the issue - leader of the City Council decided to not wait for the results of a public consultation on tree removal in Plymouth city centre and to cut them down in the middle of the night. It was deemed unlawful, in the end, but over 100 trees were cut down. They are, as with these lost in Madrid to be 'replaced'.

Greener cities are cleaner cities. They are cooler, more pleasant and more biodiverse. Thoughtful planting and park maintenance can act to mitigate the effects of pollution, flooding and noise, and can help slow or banish traffic from certain areas. It gives city dwellers a bit of space and allows birds and animals a refuge, where it might otherwise be difficult. More than that, green spaces in cities are good to look at and be in, softening the hard edges and surfaces, and providing a place to just 'be'. Ask your local councillors what the plans for your locality are and whether they intended to make the most of what greenspace has to offer.

Jason's Meat Free Recipe: Melanzane Parmagiana

A staple in my house ever since I first had it at an amazing Italian, in Birmingham (more kilometres of canals than Venice, after all...) 30 plus years ago. It's a classic southern Italian dish, which is made from layers of aubergines, tomato sauce, basil, and cheese. A sort of pasta-free lasagne which is great hot or cold and can be made in advance and cooked up to a couple of days later. It also freezes well, so it's a total all-rounder. Although it takes about an hour, it's super easy to make, it's rich, it's gooey, it's absolutely delicious and makes great use of local and easily available ingredients. You can leave the wine out, (and/or the breadcrumbs if wanting to keep it gluten free). You can also grill the aubergine slices with a spray or brush of oil instead of frying, to make it a bit lighter – the taste will still be fantastic. It is possible to use vegan 'cheese'. I've tried, although I can't lie, it isn't as good.

Ingredients for two (or four as a starter)

- 2 medium aubergines
- 1 ball (125-150g) Mozzarella
- 50-70g Grated veggie parmesan (or other Italian hard cheese, or hard Spanish ewes-milk cheese)
- 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- Olive oil to fry
- 2 tins chopped tomatoes (or the equivalent of very ripe fresh tomatoes)
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped or crushed
- 2 tbsp red wine (optional)
- 1 tsp sugar/honey
- 1 pack of fresh basil leaves, torn
- 1 tbsp breadcrumbs (optional)
- Salt and black pepper

Method

Slice the aubergines lengthways about 5mm thick - no need for precision, thin is what you're after. Put the slices in a colander and sprinkle them with salt. This used to be done to remove bitter compounds, but aubergines have pretty much had that selectively bred out of them. What this does is draw out excess water, making them firmer for the frying stage and less likely to go soft. Set them aside for about 40 mins or so and make the tomato sauce.

Finely chop the garlic and gently warm in the extra virgin olive oil in a medium saucepan until it becomes aromatic. Stir in the tinned or finely chopped tomatoes, sugar/honey and the wine. Gently bring to the boil and simmer over a low heat, partially covered and stirring occasionally until the sauce has reduced to a thick 'ragu'

consistency. If you have a stick blender, give it

a whizz. If not, then crush any bits of tomatoes

with a wooden spoon. You can of course cheat and use thick passata, but remember the garlic, wine and sweetener. Season to taste and set aside. Rinse the aubergine slices and pat dry with kitchen paper.

Heat some olive oil in a frying pan and, in batches, fry the aubergine slices on both sides until golden. Stack them up on a plate as you're going. When they're all done, spoon a little smear of the tomato sauce on the bottom of a shallow dish/cazuela and then cover in aubergine slices. We always do separate dishes, as I can be greedy... Either thinly slice or tear small pieces of mozzarella on top and a few bits of torn basil and then cover with the grated cheese. Top with tomato sauce again and repeat until you've used all the aubergine. Finish with the last of the grated cheese and the breadcrumbs. Remove after 20 mins in a medium-hot oven. It should be bubbling. Sprinkle over the rest of the basil and leave to stand for 10 mins or so. Great served with a bit of salad and crusty bread. Enjoy!


She instigated Father's Day on Día de San José because San José was considered a model father and family head. The idea spread slowly to other places, and by 1953 it had become a national phenomenon.

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

Look Good - Feel Great

The Power of Fragrance

Inhaling, smelling, sniffing – the human nose is capable of detecting the most diverse aromas. However, the act of smelling encompasses more than the simple scent. If something bothers us, "it stinks". How are our actions influenced by what is in the air?

On average, an adult will inhale and exhale 26,000 times per day. Despite the millions of scent molecules entering our nose, humans are capable of detecting and distinguishing only about 10,000 of the 400,000 scents that exist on earth.

At the same time, these must be highly concentrated. This makes us humans rather poor smellers - microsmates. By comparison, the mucus membrane of a cat's nose covers five times as much surface as that of a human, and while dogs possess approximately 240 million olfactory cells, humans must make do with only about 10 million.

All these insights do not change the fact that science knows considerably more about the other four senses than it does about the olfactory sense. The visual sense depends on the wavelength of the light, and the auditory sense detects frequencies and amplitude.

The factors that make a difference during the act of smelling are not easily discerned. This is why we refer to the other senses, when we describe a scent. A fragrance is therefore heavy or floral, or it





is circumscribed by using comparisons, such as "smells of freshly mown grass". Researchers are nevertheless certain: our olfactory sense, and what it perceives, exerts a vast influence on our daily lives – consciously and unconsciously.

For example, certain emotions may be elicited if they are connected to a scent – a fact that has been recognized since antiquity. The Greek philosopher Aristotle knew: "Man does not perceive a fragrance without experiencing a sense of either pleasure or displeasure."

Our sense of comfort also depends on what we smell. Even our mood and our actions can be manipulated, or even directed, by fragrances. Industry in particular has discovered this power of manipulation called scent branding. For the past few years, supermarkets have been enveloped in the aroma of freshly baked bread, and movie theatres smell of popcorn where there is none.

All these manipulations have the same goal: to prompt impulse purchases that visitors may not have considered in the absence of the surrounding smell. Or they are supposed to feel so comfortable that they will always return. An American hotel chain sprays its lobbies with the scent of apple pie so that guests will feel immediately at home.

They are taking advantage of the fact that the olfactory bulb is integrated into the limbic system, the very region of the brain that is responsible for processing emotions. This is why scents will typically elicit an instinctual response and only rarely a rational one.

Olfactory perception is passed directly from the hippocampus to long-term memory storage, without being filtered. For this reason, scents are closely linked to memories. When we inhale certain fragrances, images, emotions and even physical reactions often appear instinctively. Surrounded by the smell of freshly baked cookies, we think of Christmas. If a person ahead of us on the street wears a perfume that reminds us of someone familiar, that person will appear before our mind's eye.

This also works the other way around. Looking at a photograph from





our childhood, at times the very smell that our memory associates with the event will enter our noses – although it is not present at the time.

Every person has their very own olfactory memory triggers. The important difference is whether the salty smell of the ocean or the warm summer rain is linked to positive or negative memories.

Our olfactory sense not only influences our purchasing decisions and our memories. Love, too, goes through the nose. "Whoever controlled the fragrances controlled the hearts of men", says Jean-Baptiste Grenouille, the perfumer with the distinct ability to discern fragrances in Patrick Süskind's bestseller "Perfume".

We are under the impression that when it comes to the choice of a partner, external factors decide whether or not we will find someone attractive. However, it is finally the nose that guides us. Men and women with distinct aromas, in particular, will find each other interesting. The fragrance of the body represents an expression of our immune system. This is the reason our olfactory system prefers those potential partners whose bodily scent – and therefore whose immune system – is as different from our own as possible. Such a union will produce offspring who are equipped with an ideal and especially robust combination of both immune systems – an evolutionary mission that should not be underestimated.

There are, however, factors that may change olfactory preferences: the contraceptive pill, but also age and past experiences influence our reactions to scents. Even if the aroma may be the initial trigger – once we get to know a person more closely, all the senses will have their say.



What is Proximal Hamstring Tendinopathy?

Proximal Hamstring Tendinopathy (PHT) is a problem with the tendons at the back of your thigh. It typically manifests as deep buttock pain at the top of the hamstring – where it attaches onto the ischial tuberosity of your pelvis (often called your 'sit bone'), which can extend down the back of the thigh towards the knee.

PHT occurs when the tendon is overused or overloaded, and is often classed as a 'repetitive strain injury'. The process can occur over many weeks or months, or can happen more rapidly with one, highly intense exercise/activity.

If not treated properly, it can be a persistent and recurring problem.

Symptoms of PHT may include:


- Dull ache in your buttocks, thigh, knee or lower leg
- · Leg stiffness when walking or bending your knee.
- Increased pain on stretching or exercising the hamstring.
- · Weakness in the hamstrings.
- Pain with running, lunging or squatting.
- Pain when sitting, especially on a hard surface.

Most people with PHT pain respond very well to conservative management. This includes a progressive, loading exercise programme, designed and managed by your Osteopath, as well as hands-on techniques such as massage and mobilisations, Trigger Point Therapy/Medical Acupuncture.

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




Star Puzzle

Wow, what an amazing February we've had here at Olive Tree Farm! The warm end to January gave us an influx of eggs and some bright ideas to start off the month; we decided to dig the old incubator out to see if it still works. No argument off the kids!

We hand selected some of our White Star eggs, although we weren't sure if they'd be fertile yet (our eagle eyes hadn't witnessed any evidence yet), but we decided it was worth a try. And just to be safe, we added a couple of eggs from some of our older girls.

We tried to be sure to pick the more rounded shapes in the hope to hatch more hens, avoiding the more pointed ended eggs which are supposed to have a higher male rate. It'll be interesting to see if it

14 eggs went into the incubator on February 4th, giving us 20-21 days to prepare for some new arrivals. We candled them 3 days later, a process where you hold an egg over the end of a torch to see







through and see what's going on. All of them showed a healthy black spot and veins, fantastic!

Unfortunately, on day 10 — at our halfway point — we were hit with a sudden thunderstorm. At the first crack in the distance, Ben and I looked at each other in horror. There'd been no sign of storms on our weather apps, and we'd been hit with this problem in the past. Years ago, we've lost entire clutches of eggs due to thunderstorms. Whether it was us incubating or the clutches the hens themselves

As per a quick search to explain the whys in a non-magical fantasy way: "The thunder changes the humidity in the atmosphere and can dry up the airspace in the egg, it also decrease's the humidity in the incubator and can kill the embryo. It usually affects eggs in the early stages, 1st 10 days and also the last 3 days."

We were worried. Rightfully. We candled again the following day to see what the damage was.. 3 lost, but we still had 11 viable eggs. It was the biggest sigh of relief!

So, while we continued to watch the humidity levels and remembered to turn the eggs every 5 hours or so, we dealt with areas of some of the other animal's lives.

8 year old Logan is very proud of his and Ben's efforts to fix up the goose house, because our girl has moved in, made herself comfortable, and has built up a clutch of six eggs (five in the photo)!



And Ben has finally seen a successful mating between her and the males, which we haven't spotted since the girls arrived on the farm, and this gives us a budding hope for some goslings up there for the first time in 9 years.

Inspired and motivated, Logan and Ben cracked on immediately with the next project — to get the ducks' housing perfected and finished. They fixed up a perfect-sized nesting box and raised it up off the ground with thick planks of wood screwed into place, ramp and all, and then they positioned it perfectly under the ducks' favourite tree, lifted just above the surface of the channel's water flow.

It took the girls roughly 48 hours to get in there and settle in, and now they are happily up to four eggs! What an egg-cellent month

We're going to let the goose and ducks keep their eggs for now and see what happens, so fingers crossed over these next few weeks!

And, finally, 20.5 days after we began incubating the chicken eggs... They hatched in the early hours of Sunday morning, the 25th of

We have 10 healthy chicks in the growing on tank, and unfortunately one remaining egg that didn't hatch. All around, and all things considered, this wasn't a bad hatch at all!

With sudden storms and so much to do, we're so pleased with our hatch rate, and couldn't have asked for more. It'll be a few weeks before we can tell if our egg selecting at the start gave us more females, but we'll be sure to keep you updated!

Sound is one of the five (some say 6) ways that we interact with the Universe around us and is very complex. There has been extensive research into how sounds are made, how they behave and their relationships with each other and us.


My research for this article came across much about the mathematics of sound and music but no-one seems to really know why sounds have the effect they do, just that they do.

Our reactions to the sounds we hear are hard-wired from the days when we lived out in the open and our survival depended on avoiding being eaten or trampled over.



It's not just us humans that can distinguish sounds. Anyone with a dog will know that they can tell the difference in sound between a roll of Sellotape being opened and a packet of biscuits from 100 metres away during a hurricane... For now (unless anyone can enlighten me

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– gladly) I will just have to accept that middle
 C has a frequency of 261.63 Hertz and move on.

The main benefit of being constantly aware of sound is that it is always "live". Our eyes are shut when we sleep (unless your name is Gandalf the Grey) but we still hear everything and the input is still processed by our unconscious brain.

Different sounds invoke differing responses; a baby crying is a dissonant and tense sound, one where the harmonics are random and not multiples of the original sound which will always be clashing or unstable – an alarm call,

like an ambulance siren. Your brain will recognise it as a call-toarms and cause a neurological response.

If you are asleep (unlikely with a newborn baby, I know) then you will wake up. If you are already awake, you will tense up and be ready for action, whatever that may be.

Many animals use this method; dogs bark at a perceived threat - one

of the reasons that they were domesticated some twenty thousand years ago. The bond we have with dogs now transcends their somewhat limited vocal cords and dissonant vocabulary.

Somehow even cats, who generally treat us with barely concealed disdain and contempt have managed to ingratiate themselves. Other, usually softer sounds are generally pitched at frequencies which are pleasing and relaxing to hear – birdsong or a gentle breeze.

Incidentally, it was thought that birdsong was the basis for Western music but this is not necessarily the case. Studies have concluded that although birdsong is generally pleasing on the ear, it does not necessarily mean that the birds are singing "music".

They do not follow the scales and chord progressions used by music. Birdsong is used to communicate using pitch, rhythm, and melody to convey information. That information is not necessarily detailed and specific in terms of language as we understand it. It is used to convey basic messages such as "This is



my patch" or "I'm big and strong – don't mess" or "Hello ladies, want some 'us' time?".

The way we use musical notes carries a much less specific message, eliciting the required response from the listener. Nature, however will occasionally throw a curve ball into the mix and that ball belongs to "Polly want a cracker?"

Extensive studies have been made of why Parrots mimic human speech. The general consensus is that it is part of their social integration behaviour. Parrots have learned to mimic the group around them in much the same way that dialects in human language are formed, part of belonging.

A lone Parrot cannot feed and protect itself at the same time but a group can share responsibility. By having their own

code, as it were they can easily identify each other.

All animals develop differing dialects naturally but birds such as Parrots can actively change it depending on their surroundings. They are so adept at it that they are able to mimic human speech. Again, 'how' is not very well understood apart from analysis of Parrots' brains that shows they have a highly-developed communication section and it differs from other birds, having much more complex vocal cords.

Incidentally, the physical size of the brain does not necessarily correlate with intelligence. Animals with larger bodies generally have larger brains for a specific reason. Your body relies on electrical impulses from the brain to function and a larger body needs more "juice" to run it.

You need a decent-sized engine. You wouldn't run a truck with a two-cylinder engine from a Fiat 500. It wouldn't move. You need a dirty great 8 litre diesel.

Outside of mammals, birds have proven themselves to be highly intelligent; Crows are problem solvers and many birds have complex migration routes. Parrots do not necessarily understand what they are "saying" but are fitting in with the social group in which they find themselves. They are keen observers of behaviour and the fact

that it will say "Good morning" to you when you enter the room is because that is the sound it has heard being made on a regular basis when someone enters the room.

They are able to remember up to roughly 500 phrases irrespective of language. They can learn English, Spanish, German... any language or combination thereof. It is not uncommon for Parrots to use Spanish with one person and English with another because they remember the difference.

So, how does all this relate to your favourite song?

Well... a well-written song will connect with the listener on a fundamental level. The rhythm or beat is related to our heartbeat - a continual sound in the womb. It evokes a place of ultimate safety and belonging and a decent beat will have you up on your feet before you know it.

Your favourite song will always have a connection to a certain point in time; your wedding dance, the party on the beach where you met the love of your life or the song that was everywhere during your first year in Spain.

It doesn't have to be happy or sad, triumphant or mellow – it just has to mean something to you.

What's your anthem?







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Joe Meek (1929-67) Recording engineer and record producer

57th anniversary of his passing, I had to write something. For those of us that grew up in the '60s, Joe Meek may be a familiar name. I would call him one of the truly innovate record producers / sound engineers Britain had. I had a 45rpm of Monte Carlo, by the Tornados on the Decca label, which was one of his productions. I wore it out!

As a youngster, Joe realised his love for electronics, taking over his father's shed, modifying radio sets and making all sorts of electronic gear. After finishing National Service as a radar engineer, he worked

for the Electricity Board in the Midlands. He had become very interested in music production and recording and managed to acquire a secondhand record disc cutting machine.

Joe left the Electric Board and joined a radio production company, making material for independent record labels and radio stations such as Luxemburg. He gained much admiration following his work on the recordings of the Ivy Benson's all-girl Dance Band and Jazz Trumpeter Humphrey Littleton. Joe understood the importance of "engineering" the recordings. Remember, in the late '50s for most of us, all we had were AM, Medium wave wireless sets and 78 rpm records. These had very limited frequency and dynamic ranges. So, to make the most of that, Meek compressed, topped-tailed the recordings, so that they sounded as good as possible when played on little record players and budget radios. Humphrey Littleton recalled that on a recording of 'Bad Penny Blues', Meek had compressed and uplifted the piano to give a big thumping presence. Littleton went mad, as recording was released without his hearing it first. He thought it didn't sound original. However, it was a smash hit. Well, got in the Top 20!

In 1960, Meek set up Triumph Records and eventually moved into a 3 storey flat above a leather shop in London's Holloway Road. One room was a control room, with lots of home-made recording equipment. 2 track tape machines, mixers, echo chambers, compressors etc. Ferrograph, Vortexion, EMI, all household equipment names. Other rooms contained various microphones and special effects gear. He would have piano and guitars in one room, drums and bass in others and some vocalists in his bathroom. Musicians such as Joe Brown often complained of getting electric shocks from microphones and guitars! Artists recording there included Lonnie Donegan (Cumberland gap), Johnny Leyton (Just Like Eddie), The Honeycombs (Have I the right) and of course The Tornados with Telstar, which was a number one



hit in '62. This set Joe up as the go-to producer. A classic example of Meek's playing around with recordings, can be heard at the beginning to the record Telstar. The strange Sci-Fi mechanical sound introduction, was actually a recording of an old tractor played at a slower speed and backwards. His recordings were over-dubbed many times, adding different instruments and vocal and effects. This detracted from HiFi quality. The record companies Joe used to press the records always complained about the quality of the recordings. But Meek knew this would

produce a distinctive sound. It did. And, people loved it.

Joe was known to be hard to work with, and during the mid '60s, he was running into financial problems. The royalties for the record Telstar, Joe never got. A French composer said Joe had copied his tune. The case was eventually dropped, after Joe's death. The remains of his recording company was awarded £3 million. He was convinced that Decca Records was bugging his studio to steal his recording secrets and would not let anyone into the building if he was not there. He had a real "thing" about communicating with the dead and would leave tape machines running all night in the hope of recording voices from the other side. He produced the Mike Berry recording "Tribute to Buddy Holly" following Buddy's death. Of course, being gay in the 60s was a bit of a problem and in '63 he was fined for importuning. He never recovered from this, and it fed an on-going depression. Many musicians slipped through his hands and it's said that Brian Epstein asked Meek what he thought of a group called the Beatles. Joe said don't sign them up, they're no good! Another faux pas was his agreeing to record a small band as long as the singer was replaced. The singer being a young Rod Stewart. In '67, in his recording studio, Meek shot himself after killing his landlady.

It is very sad thinking about someone who paved the way for modern recording techniques ending up like this. He was an early experimenter with compression, reverb, direct connection of instruments into recording desks, multi-tracking and so on. Phil Spector, well known for his "Wall-Of-Sound" image, said that he owed much of this to Meek's own inventiveness. I could go on and on, but not enough

So, off to pop my copy of Telstar on the radiogram. Listening Joe? Pop into my shop one day. Seth Pittham. Zeta services

10 dangerous (and frequent) infractions

When you change lanes, do you always turn on the correct indicator? On motorways, do you usually occupy the left lane? Have you checked your car tyres lately?

Whether due to forgetfulness or bad habit, every day we cause situations of great risk behind the wheel, without even being aware of it, and they are completely avoidable.

According to a report issued by Trafico, the following are some of the most dangerous frequent infractions and their corresponding

1. Check your tyres!

Driving on worn tyres or with an incorrect inflation pressure on wet, snowy or icy roads causes a significant loss of adhesion.

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

A loss that is accentuated when the depth of the main grooves of the tread is less than 4 millimeters (remember, the minimum legal depth required for passenger cars is 1.6 millimeters). Driving with a vehicle whose tyres do not have a tread or do not meet the minimum conditions of use is a serious infraction carrying a fine of $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{C}} 200$ per tyre.

2. Without lights!

The headlights not only illuminate, they also place the vehicle on the road. Driving without lights when these are necessary, or with damaged or low lights, makes it difficult for other drivers to calculate the width and position of your vehicle.

Before getting into your car, check the lighting of your vehicle: driving without adequate lighting at times of poor visibility (sunset and sunrise, at night, with fog ...) is a risk that can be avoided and is considered a serious violation with a penalty of €200.

3. Moderate your speed!

When we approach pedestrian crossings without traffic lights, residential areas, schools and buses that are at their stops we must









moderate the speed, or even stop the vehicle if necessary, to avoid accidents. Violations of this rule for driving without caution or even negligently are considered serious when they cause danger and are sanctioned with up to a $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{C}} 260$ fine.

4. Use your indicator!

You will surely know from your own experience that there are manoeuvres (a lane change, for example) that are signalled at short notice or not signalled at all, these can cause sudden and unexpected shocks and risks. Warning your manoeuvres to other users is mandatory and not doing so is a serious infraction with a penalty of €200.

5. Stay in the correct lane!

On motorways and highways it is common to see drivers occupying the centre and left lanes while the right is free. According to the regulations, on interurban roads with more than one lane per direction, cars must always drive on the right. Failure to do so, hindering the driving of other drivers, is a serious infraction with a $\[\epsilon \]$ 200 fine.

6. Stopping on a bus stop!

Stopping and parking on bus stops is disrespectful to other road users







and dangerous particularly to the pedestrians who may have to walk into the road to get on the bus. That is why these are considered serious infractions and incur a €200 fine.

7. Give way or Stop?

Mandatory stop signs are usually located at crossroads where visibility is poor or zero. For this reason, you have to completely stop the vehicle to observe that there is no risk. The law establishes that to make another driver who has the right of way break or manoeuvre, or not stopping at a regulated intersection with the mandatory stop signal, is a serious infraction and is sanctioned with a fine of $\ensuremath{\in} 200$ and the loss of 4 points.

8. Insecure cargo

Vehicles with poorly held loads can lead to risky situations for the vehicles behind, especially on high speed roads. Driving a vehicle whose cargo has fallen onto the road due to poor strapping, creating







danger for other users is a very serious infraction with a €500 fine.

9. Opening the car door

After parking, we take off our belts and get out ... Be careful! Before opening the door, look in the rear view mirror, it can cause serious damage to a cyclist who passes by your vehicle at that precise moment. This type of negligent behaviour that causes danger to other users is considered a serious infraction and a fine of $\[mathebox{\ensuremath{}}\]$ 260.

10. Parking on the pavement

When you park, occupying part or all of the pavement for whatever reason, you 'steal' a vital space from pedestrians, possibly 'pushing' them to dangerous situations when they walk on the road to get past the badly parked vehicle. Parking on pedestrian areas is a serious infraction and carries a fine of £200.





Pedal Power

A first bike is the childhood equivalent of a driver's license, but those familiar, two-wheeled, pedal-powered machines (and the outdoor trails best for riding them) aren't just for kids — bicycles transformed the nature of human mobility and are even a great way to get around in some cities. The two-wheeler concept dates back centuries, but modern bikes only emerged fairly recently. Once merely a novelty, bicycles are now a multi-billion dollar industry and a part of human culture on nearly every corner of the Earth.

The First Bikes Were Called 'Velocipedes'. Before there were bicycles, there were velocipedes. Primitive, pedal-less, and unsteerable wooden precursors to bikes emerged at the end of the 18th century, but in 1818, a guy named Baron von Drais earned a patent for a device with a padded saddle and a steerable front wheel. The patent was filed under the name "velocipede." The term "bicycle" did not emerge until 1869.

Some Velocipedes Were Known as 'Boneshakers' for Good Reason. In the 1860s in France, the Michaex Company produced a type of velocipede known as the "Boneshaker." It was a fitting nickname. The beastly bikes weighed 60 pounds, could go as fast as 8 mph, and rode on solid tyres. It would be an understatement to say they were uncomfortable to ride.

The First Geared Bike Was Called the "Ariel". In 1871, a man named James Starley made a huge leap forward in the history of cycling when he developed the first geared bike. Known as the Ariel, the gear system combined technology from three different patents. Although it was limited to the shortcomings of primitive front-wheel-drive velocipedes, cyclists could now change gears — but it wasn't easy.

The Path to Safety Bicycles Was a Rocky One. Although gears helped, there was a huge flaw with the first two-speed bicycles: riders had to stop, dismount, remove the wheel, flip it around, and reattach it. Then, if they weren't completely exhausted by the process, they could keep riding. Life improved for early bicyclists when John Kemp Starley invented the first safety bicycle, the Rover, in 1885. With two equal-sized wheels and a chain drive train fixed to the rear wheel instead of the front, the Rover effectively killed whatever limited enthusiasm there was for the velocipede.

The Wright Brothers Started on Two Wheels. Before they conquered the skies, the Wright brothers were a force to be reckoned with on the ground. Both Wilbur and Orville were caught up in the bike craze that took off in the 1890s after the invention of the safety bicycle. Orville even won a rocking chair in a race once, but they didn't just participate in the trend — they profited from it. The brothers owned several bike shops in Dayton, Ohio, before going into bicycle manufacturing and design. Ingenuitive and ambitious by nature, they were responsible for many significant cycling





innovations. The Wrights were a success, quickly earning and saving thousands of dollars in a time when most Americans made just \$500 a year. Much of their profits went to financing their more ambitious project — the one that made them famous and allowed the human race to travel through the sky.

The Sport of Cycling Is More Than 150 Years Old. The first true bike race took place between the entrance and the fountains of Saint-Cloud park outside of Paris on May 31, 1868. The race, which was won by an 18-year-old Paris-born English expatriate named James Moore, spanned a distance of 1,312 yards.

Cycling Pre-Dates Baseball and Basketball in the U.S. Cycling doesn't just go back a long way in Europe, it's one of the oldest sports in the United States, as well. America's first bike race took place in Boston on May 24, 1878. That's 13 years before the invention of basketball and two years before the emergence of America's pastime, baseball. Cycling became wildly popular in America at the end of the 19th century, and it was one of the biggest and most popular sports in that country. By the 1890s, more than 600 pro cyclists competed on a coast-to-coast national circuit from San Francisco to Boston and in every major city in between. The country was home to more than 100 cycling tracks.

Madison Square Garden Had the First Velodrome. It is known worldwide as the home of the Rangers, the Knicks, and every concert worth seeing — but it's actually the fourth venue to bear that name. The first MSG was located, fittingly, near New York City's Madison Square in the late 19th century and was leased to P.T. Barnum. It was the home of the very first velodrome, a special type of cycle racing track that was used when the sport was at its peak in the U.S. The Garden was to cycle racing then what it is to basketball today — the centre of that sport's universe.
