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

Residencia to TIE Exchange & TIE Renewal

Do you know when your TIE is due to expire?

Come July 2025, it will be 5 years since the introduction of the TIE card for UK nationals, who were resident in Spain with either a green A4 or credit card size certificate. It was part of the Brexit withdrawal agreement.

Many people took the opportunity to exchange right away, and these are the people this article is mainly calling out to in the first instance.

A TIE is valid for either 5 or 10 years depending on how long a person had previously held the green paper residencia. Usually, when a 5-year card is renewed it will become valid for 10 years and instead of indicating temporary residencia it will state 'permanente' and like all photo ID it will need to continue to be renewed every 10 years.





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The green paper residencia has no expiry date so it has that in its favour however, the benefits of the photo card as a form of ID and for travel purposes far outweighs the pain of having to renew it after 5 or 10 years.

The exchange and renewal processes are the same and require 2 trips to the Foreigner's Office in Almeria or National Police Station in Roquetas de Mar or El Ejido, wherever the appointment can be obtained. For those living outside the Almeria province, there are similar facilities, and they are all listed on the Ministry of Interior's website, which is where the first appointment is obtained.

The process will require a current passport with at least three months of validity so that is the next document to check to see when it expires and get it renewed as soon as possible if necessary.

For the exchange process, the original green residencia must be presented at the appointment. If this has been lost or stolen over the years, then a police report will be required instead.

As well as the passport and residencia/TIE card, it will be necessary to take a Padron certificate and small photo as well as the application form and tax form prepaid at the bank.

Obtaining an appointment is the most crucial element of the process, especially for those renewing their TIE. The key is to get one for about 2 months before expiry so that your current card does not expire while waiting to collect the renewal.

Fingerprint appointments, particularly in Almeria, are not always that easy to obtain so it is a good idea to check the system regularly to see what dates are currently available. In order to do this a digital signature is required or registering with a local company who provide the exchange/renewal service.

The first appointment will require you to have fingerprints taken and all documents handed in. The second appointment, usually some 6-8 weeks later, will be to collect the card. Both appointments must be attended in person with original documents.

Those of you who are here with TIE cards issued as part of the visa programme are not affected by these procedures.

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Spanish Provinces

Spain is divided into 17 regions and the enclaves of Ceuta and Melilla on the African continent, all of which were granted autonomy under the Constitution of 1978. Thus they are now referred to as Comunidades Autónomas (Autonomous Regions) and Ciudades Autónomas (Autonomous Cities) respectively. The majority of these regions are divided into provinces, each with its provincial government (Diputación Provincial), except those regions that consist of only one province, like Murcia for example, where the regional and provincial governments are rolled into one. There are 50 provinces in Spain, each with its own capital city which usually, but not always, carries the same name as the province. And so our journey continues



The province of Ávila is situated in Castilla y León and borders the provinces of Valladolid, Salamanca, Cáceres, Toledo, Segovia and Madrid. The province covers an area of 8,051.15m2 and has a population of 160,463 souls giving it a population density of 19.93 inhabitants per km2. The population of the province constitutes just 0.33% of the total Spanish population.

The province's claim to fame is the fact that it is the province with the highest average altitude in Spain at 1,022.59m.

The capital of the same name boasts a similar distinction: At 1,131 metres above sea level, it is the highest provincial capital in Spain. With its population of 58,111 (2024) and is one of Spain's least populated capitals.

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You could be entitled to extra income by claiming UK sickness/disability benefits while living in Spain For advice or to book a consultation call 950 169 729 or 663 297 568 or visit www.ukbenefitsinspain.com It boasts no less than three titles which were bequeathed by three different kings: Ávila del Rey (king) by King Alfonso VII, Ávila de los Leales (loyal) by King Alfonso VIII and Ávila de los Caballeros (Knights) by King Alfonso X. All three kings had at one time or another been protected and helped in the city against various prosecutors.

Being as high as it is, it is natural that the climate should be quite fresh, and indeed the average temperature for the whole year is a shivery 11°C! The winters are cold and snowy and often the temperature drops below freezing. The summers are warm, though, with daytime temperatures averaging the high twenties, but even that time of year the nights are cool at between 10 and 15°C. Precipitations are usually plentiful from October to April; however, the summers are dry and before proper water supply to the city was secured, droughts in summer were a common occurrence.

One of the city's main sources of income is tourism, and it is a treasure trove of historical and religious buildings, and of course the famous wall that surrounds the whole of the old city is a must see for any visitor – in fact you cannot avoid seeing it as you approach the city! However, probably due to the city's limited size, the average time of overnight stays is just one night.

Archeological findings in Ávila indicate that there were settlements there already in Celtic times, but the first actual fortifications on this hilltop on the Castilian plateau were built by the Romans.

After the Romans left, the city changed between Moorish and Christian rule for centuries, until Alfonso VI finally ousted the Muslims in 1090. He also extended the fortifications, and the wall we see today dates back to the 1100's although it has been extended





and renovated over the centuries.


The wall is 10m high and three meters wide and boasts an impressive 88 towers and rooks. It stretches 2.5 km round the town and there are nine gates leading to the old part of the city.

Inside the wall, the Cathedral of Christ the Saviour dominates the townscape. The apse of the cathedral forms part of the fortification wall, and at the front it has one of the oldest Gothic cathedral façades in Spain.

It is not possible to walk all the way round on top of the wall, but there are two access places that allow you to get up on the wall and walk along for a distance.

In 1884 the wall was declared a National Monument, and since 1985, the old town of Ávila with its wall and the churches of San Vicente, San Pedro, San Andrés and San Segundo have been considered World Heritage by UNESCO.

Of course, there is more to Ávila than history, and a natural follow-



on to the tourism it generates is a very large service sector.

The gastronomy is well worth exploring, and the restaurants of Ávila offer a large variety of warming dishes to help you through the cooler times of the year. One of the famous specialities is the Chuletón (steak) de Ávila, which is actually a T-bone steak, and this one comes from the local beef cattle, the Vaca Avileña Negra Ibérica, and it is superb!

Other specialities include Patatas Revolconas, potatoes mashed with paprika served with meat, Mollejas de Ternera, veal sweetbreads, and Yemas de Avila, small cakes.





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

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Heating in Spain

Central heating is essential in winter in northern and central Spain and is useful in some other areas - winters can be chilly everywhere with the exception of the Canaries. If you like a warm home in winter, you will almost certainly miss central heating.

Central heating systems in Spain may be powered by oil, gas, electricity, solid fuel (usually wood) or even solar power. Oil-fired central heating isn't common due to the high cost of heating oil and the problems associated with storage and deliveries.

In rural areas, many houses have open, wood-burning fireplaces operating from standard gas bottles, which costs around €2,000 for and stoves, which may be combined with a central heating system. a small home. The Spanish oil providers Cepsa and Repsol offer Whatever form of heating you use, it's important to have good good deals on gas central heating, including low-cost financing of the insulation, without which up to 60 per cent of the heat generated is installation. Electric



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Solar Energy







January had been steady and long here at Olive Tree Farm, never seeming to end, but that gave us a good reason to take things a little slower - as slow as one can with a menagerie on board.

Our experiment leaving a tiny flock of chickens in the aviary has finally seen some success in the egg department - it's been nice to have a steady flow coming from a smaller area, with no farm drama to ruffle their feathers.

These guys have a big job this year, as they'll be taking over sections of the garden as Spring and Summer come into play, and help us along with some weeding!

Under some supervision of course, a great excuse to sit by the pond with a glass of wine, to keep the pesky things off the flowers. I'm already envisioning the warmer weather now we've finally left the darkest days of the year behind us. We may have some cold spots hitting us on and off, a few wind-battering days trying to get everyone fed and sorted, but the warmer months are finally getting nearer.

If you've followed us for a while, then you'll know what this means... hatching time!

Last month I mentioned Ben's careful collection and separation of Muscovy duck eggs, building up a nice clutch out of sight of the eggdevouring children.

We placed 24 into the incubator a couple of weeks ago. Some of these were early eggs, as the females have only just reached the right age, so we didn't expect them all to be fertile. At the moment, around 50% are showing good promise!

As seems to be the way, one of our lovely Muscovy ladies on the farm





has also taken it upon herself to hatch a few with a more personal touch. She's currently sitting on 12 eggs, and we're keeping a watchful eye that she gets plenty to eat, while wishing the mama-tobe good luck for her tedious job.

Thankfully, we somehow all timed the incubation process around the same time. So when our house-ducklings hatch, we will be keeping an eye on mum and her small crew - fingers crossed!

We're thinking of creating a partition of the nesting box she's using, in the hopes that when the hatching day comes and the little ones find their feet, they aren't immediately startled by their farmyard neighbours.





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Security is hardly a problem, however, as we have our farm cats prowling and keeping an eye on things as we move throughout the farm. They are funny creatures; they won't be left behind, and we often have the troop behind us, even when we're leaving. They're as loyal as dogs, which I'm sure they'd find offensive if we told them

The geese have been spending a lot of time together and, as Mrs Duck has shown, the time is clearly ripe for mating season all around.

The male goose has been very attentive to his girl and her calls, but has frequently expressed a little too much fondness for Ben. He won't leave Ben alone without first receiving a good cuddle and some strokes, but seems to get funny ideas and tries climbing up... Ben sighs every day at this new routine, but we laugh and hope it is a good sign, and that the boy is just as loving with the female when we aren't around.

We'll have to wait and see!

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TECH, TV, GADGETS & GIZMOS

Hello again. I hope the New Year resolutions vou made lasted at least a week. Mine didn't, I like chocolate too much!

Anyhow, this month we will be looking (quite literally probably) into one of the universe's contradictions, which I alluded to last month – what is light?

Light or "visible electromagnetic radiation" occupies a narrow section of the electromagnetic spectrum. It is still not completely understood as it displays wave properties (like ripples on a pond) and contains packets of energy without mass (photons).

Try not to think of photons as a thing, more as a process of transferring energy from one point to another. I know, doesn't really make sense, does it? All electromagnetic emissions travel at the speed of light (funnily enough) which, for those of you who want to know is 186,000 miles per second.

The electromagnetic spectrum ranges from radio waves at its lower end all the way up to Gamma and X-Rays which have the shortest wavelength. Visible light sits comfortably somewhere in the middle.

X-Rays have an extremely high

frequency (amount of waves per second, inverse to the wavelength: v=f λ , where v=speed of light, f=frequency and λ =wavelength) and are therefore much more energetic to start with. To explain; transpose the idea to what you can hear. A high frequency whistle can be heard above other noises and can travel quite a distance whilst not taking too much energy to create. To make a low-frequency sound (like a fart - for example) audible at the same distance and intensity would take a lot more effort and most likely a change of underwear at the very least.

Want another contradiction? Why does sunlight from 93 million miles away make you feel warm but a TV mast down the road doesn't? They're both electromagnetic, right?



TV (radio) signals contain a lot less energy per unit than sunlight. Sunlight contains a high amount of infrared light which is high enough in energy to excite/agitate/annoy the electrons in non-conductive materials such as your skin. Radio waves need a conductor (metal aerial and/or copper wire) to enact the transfer of energy.

So how does all this Hogwarts dark magic explain what you see? Or is it all a load of Muggle bunkum?

All objects absorb and reflect light in varying amounts (and to each side too - ultraviolet and infrared). As I covered last month, other

> species of animal have honed their eyesight to detect frequencies outside of our ability (ultraviolet).

The human eye is capable of detecting ultraviolet light but the lens filters it out, probably to protect the retina from damage. There have been cases, one of which was the impressionist painter Claude Monet who, after having cataract surgery started producing work with a much more bluish hue.

Our eyes have developed so that we are able to detect and organise the photons emitted into an image that our brain can process. The waves of light provide a steady

stream of photons that activate receptors in our eyes, sending the resultant information down the optic nerve. And while we're on this thread, our eyes have developed under "white" light conditions, adapted specifically for this planet.

Several years ago there was something of a hissy cat-fight amongst the scientific community following the release of doctored pictures of the surface of Mars. It is a well-known fact that the surface of Mars is red, right? Although sunlight is white, it is altered by the dust particles in Mars' atmosphere, tilting the colour balance towards the red end of the spectrum.

To the apoplectic horror of the snowflakes (sorry, purists - got to be





fair, do we?), some miscreant decided to publish a photo as if it was taken under Earth-like white light! What a dire liberty! Although the image did reveal more information about the terrain, it was not a purely accurate representation. Shame... (clang!)

Spain is a country that is fortunate enough to have large areas that are not blighted with light pollution. The night sky is a wonder to behold in its infinite and serene majesty. The millions of pinpoints So does this all mean that our eyes are basically satellite dishes and of light it holds each tell a story much more magical and bizarre than our brain a Sky box? The short answer is yes (although I'm not anything you can see on TV. Even with Elon Musk's processionary 100% sure where you put the viewing card). satellites traipsing across the sky.

Our eyes are attuned to a specific part of the whole spectrum where the waves interact with special molecules and structures. They also do not require highly-conductive metals to function, relying instead on the intrinsically high energy of the light itself to do the job biomechanically.

Not only that, in order to pick up the lower-frequency radio signals, our eyes would need to be significantly larger than they are. Also, what we perceive as different hues and colours are just our brains making some sort of sense of the information it receives.

As with anything our brain processes, it is no more than a virtual concept of the outside world and could, in all reality be nowhere near to the truth. We all live our lives subjectively and our interactions with the world around us are uniquely personal. There are also aberrations and defects to take into account - colour blindness being just one.

But what about the other way around? Could you broadcast a radio TV signal in the visible spectrum so that people could just watch a TV by closing their eyes? That's a frightening thought. Imagine waking up in the night to find Ant & Dec jumping around in front of you. Or worse (?) Thankfully the answer to that one is a resounding NO! It is theoretically possible to broadcast an electromagnetic signal in the visible part of the spectrum, however there are a few minor issues.

Firstly there is the broadcast wave type to take into account. AM (Amplitude Modulated) work by varying the intensity of the carrier signal by adding the sound or image data.

You may have seen this on TV when a smooth wave pattern is






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distorted on an oscilloscope to portray a noise. If this signal was broadcast in the visible spectrum then it would appear as a glow of one colour around the mast that flickered in intensity.

Curiously enough, this technology is already in use (kind of). Anyone that uses an optical fibre internet connection is using visible light to transfer data. In this case, a light is interfaced with the signal at source. Although we can see the light, it will be a meaningless flicker as the coding used in fibre-optic data transfer is equipmentspecific. Light is a particularly useful medium for this application but needs to be contained by the fibre strand otherwise it would quickly dissipate into nothing.

FM (Frequency Modulated) light would be much more of a show. The mast would glow with a myriad of colours and intensity as the signal makes it wander around the spectrum.

The visible spectrum is not used for general radio broadcasting for several reasons; the technology required would cost a fortune, the signals would be subject to massive interference and would you really want the sky lit up day & night with light pollution?



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When Portable Radios were not as portable!!

Ever since Marconi got fed up with painting his bathroom and decided to popularise the wireless (he didn't invent it remember!), we have wanted to carry one around with us. In the 1920-30's, sets were nice and big, using valves and components that one would find in a normal tabletop set, indeed. Two small differences really; one being that some bright spark had screwed a handle on the top and the other, you needed batteries. Now, to operate the valves, batteries had to be substantial. You required an accumulator cell (big jam jar, like a small lead acid car battery), giving a couple of volts to drive the valve filaments (to make them hot), a high voltage HT (high tension) battery around 90-120 volts and a smaller battery for Grid Bias. Add the lot to a big square frame aerial and a speaker. Chuck this in the back of your Austin 7 or Rover 12, which could just about manage the weight (women had to ask their husbands to lift the wireless in and out the car because in those

days ladies weren't very strong you understand, pre-WOKE etc.) and drive off to your picnic. On a good day, you could find a station to listen to, BBCs' 2LO (coming from The Strand in London) or the Home service coming from that strange place called the Midlands. The radio lasted for about an hour and a half before the batteries went flat. When you wanted these recharging, you would take them down to your local bicycle shop, where they would have the charging equipment to do such a job. They were set up for charging motorcycle batteries and so charging radio accumulators was a good money spinner. Because your listening time on the wireless was precious, the conversation in the bicycle shop was all about the best programmes to listen to and who did what in all the afternoon dramas. Real gossip.

In the 50's Mullard created a new range of small 7 pin valves, "D' series, which were designed to use little power. Now we had a radio that was portable, weighing a few pounds, not half a ton. Still had to have batteries, 1.5V dry cell for the filaments, a 90V one for the HT and 1.5V for bias. These batteries cost in today's money about 20€ Who remembers the nice bright blue and red oblong batteries Eveready?! Now you could get a week's use from them



and a bit more if you put the batteries in the oven for 20 minutes with the Sunday roast, when they became flat. Most of the sets had a "mains" option so you could give up the silly portable idea and leave the set indoors. A common design was a mini attaché case style with a lid that opened up. As the lid opened, this normally brought the set to life. The lid also housed an aerial. The battery company Eveready made lots of these sets, along with a round weatherproof set made from saucepans, painted in blue Hammerite paint. These were aimed at the African market, were insect, little finger and spear proof.

By the late 50's and 60's, transistors were used in portables. Sets were now tiny, about the size a large pack of fags, with a little speaker that squawked away, and came with a fake leather carry case. They used a PP3 9V battery which was cheap. Who remembers seeing on the back "Empire

Made" and "Made in Hong Kong?" When GB was GB!

A great British company called Roberts made lovely sets. Wooden case, big speaker, tone controls etc. They sounded fantastic, like the big wireless in the corner of Grandma's living room. In the 60's their chief engineer, Mr. Hacker, left Roberts to start his own radio company and called it Hacker, great imagination. No surprise that the resulting sets were solid and perhaps over engineered, sounded great and worked well but being built like a Victorian out-house, were expensive. As time went on, however, competing with the Far East closed the business. Shame.

By the 70's and 80's, most of the UK radio manufacturing had been hived off to China and elsewhere, with just some of the brand names continuing, having been bought by holding companies. Bush, Alba, Murphy and so on. But never fear, we had the Ghetto Blaster, for those with a chip on one shoulder to help keep the balance whilst carrying it on the other.


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Rosetta

I would translate 'Patatas Revolconas' to something like 'Manhandled Potatoes', but the word 'revolcón' is not easy to translate, as it covers a range of more or less brutal ways of treating people or objects, so if you don't like the name Manhandled Potatoes, please feel free to find you own name for them. The dish is also known as Patatas 'Revueltas' (scrambled), 'Meneadas' (wagged) or 'Removidas' (swirled). A dear child has many names, we say in Denmark, but the sure thing is that these poor potatoes have to suffer through some violent preparation or other before being ready to serve.

Like all Spain's most traditional dishes, Patatas Revolconas is made from very basic ingredients that were usually available to humble country folk. However, today it is mostly seen as a tapa in tapas bars and restaurants, especially in the Castilla y Leon and Extremadura regions.

Isn't it funny how so many plain, traditional, folksy dishes often get the gourmet Michelin treatment these days, and are sold for an



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amount of money that the old folks could have lived on for a week!

The dish consists of potatoes (obviously) with bacon and paprika. I say bacon, but any part of a pig that comes with fat and skin will do.


To make Patatas Revolconas, you boil your potatoes until they are completely tender. You can peel them before or after boiling them, whichever you prefer, but the skin has to come off sooner or later.

Fry the pieces of bacon, or whatever, in plenty of olive oil until they are nicely golden without being burnt.

Remove them and fry sliced garlic in the same oil until they are just turning brown, then turn off the heat and add both mild and hot (just a small pinch of the hot) smoked paprika.

You then pour the garlic and paprika oil over the potatoes and mash them with a fork until they have absorbed and mixed well with the red oil.

I took the opportunity to do some slow cooking and warmed up my kitchen nicely at the same time as enjoying the aromas wafting through the house.

It was difficult to choose which ones to share with you; I ended up with two with chicken and two with pork, all of them filled with lovely vegetables.

I'm sure you'll like them as much as I did!

Chicken and Peppers

I've often cooked a chicken leg with potatoes and lots of whole garlic cloves, as a sort of poor man's Chicken with 40 Cloves of Garlic

I fancied a chicken leg, but decided to try something new, so I left out the garlic and oregano and used peppers and paprika instead.

I had bought one of those packets with a red, a green and a yellow pepper (part of) which I used, and I loved it!

Ingredients for 1:

- 1 whole chicken leg
- 2 good sized potatoes, scrubbed and sliced
- Half each of a red, green and yellow pepper, cut into strips
- 150ml chicken stock
- Olive oil
- Paprika, salt and pepper

Heat the oil on a small frying pan and brown the chicken leg on both sides. Sprinkle with paprika (I used smoked), salt and pepper.

In the same oil, quickly brown the potatoes and peppers and place them in an oven proof dish.

Sprinkle with salt, but be careful, the stock is also salty. Place the chicken leg on top.

Pour the stock in the frying pan, bring it to the boil, loosen the sediments from the bottom, and pour it over the vegetables and chicken.

Cook it in the oven at 200°C for 40-45 minutes, until the chicken is cooked through.

I promise you; you have something to look forward to!!









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
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Vegetable Feta Bake with Chicken Wings

Yet again I found myself with leftovers from various other meals; when you cook for one, this is inevitable, as nobody sells a quarter of an aubergine or cauliflower, or two sticks of celery. And if you use a whole aubergine or a cauliflower for one meal, you won't be able to eat anything else!

I usually make enough for two, though, as the other half comes in handy on dog training nights.

Ingredients for two:

- ¹/₂ aubergine, cubed
- 1/4 cauliflower, divided into florets
- 2 short sticks celery, sliced
- 8-10 cherry tomatoes
- 75g feta cheese
- Olive oil
- Black pepper

8-10 chicken wing pieces, ready marinated

Place all the vegetables in an ovenproof dish. Pour over some olive oil and mix well.

Crumble the feta cheese over the top and give it all a couple of twists of black pepper. No salt necessary as the cheese is quite salty.


Place the chicken wings in a separate dish.

Stick the vegetable dish in the oven at 200°C for a total of 40 minutes. After ten minutes, put the chicken wings in as well and continue cooking for about half an hour.

I put a naan bread in as well for the last couple of minutes, and it went a treat!

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Hot(ish) Paprika Chops in the **Oven**

I'm not a great one for very spicy food, but I do like it to have a little bite. So I mixed my hot and sweet smoked paprikas to my liking you can change the ratios to suit your own palate.

It is a rather 'wet' dish, so it doesn't manage to look all roasted and toasted although it is made in the oven, but what it lacks in looks, it makes up for in flavours!!

I used, as almost always, the nicely fat marbled 'cabeza de lomo' which I believe translates into shoulder. The fat marbling gives a lovely flavour!

The 'guindillas' are preserved, long, green chilis which are sold in jars in all supermarkets.

Ingredients for two:

- 4 pork chops
- 1 tbsp smoked paprika mixed with
- 1 tsp hot, smoked paprika and

Salt and pepper

Olive oil

¹/₂ aubergine, cut into 1 cm cubes

3 tomatoes, cut into wedges

1 large onion, cut into wedges

150ml stock

1 tsp cumin

1 tbsp preserved 'guindillas', chopped


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Rub the chops with the paprika mix. Heat the oil in a frying pan and brown them on both sides. Put them into a greased, ovenproof dish.

Place the aubergine cubes and tomato and onion wedges over the meat.

Mix the stock with the rest of the ingredients, and pour it over the vegetables. Season with salt, but be careful as the stock is salty in itself.

Cover and slow cook in the oven at 150°C for one and a half hours. Take off the lid/alu foil, turn the heat up to 200°C and cook on for about 20 minutes.

Check the meat – it should be very tender.

Serve with pita or naan bread.



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Goulash Soup

I've always thought, f you have to put all that time into it anyway, why not make proper goulash rather than just goulash soup? I found a very good reason the other week: I fancied soup more than a casserole dish.

I stumbled over a very attractive recipe, tried it, and found almost nothing to tweak.

I served it with a big dollop of Greek yoghurt and some bread, and the yoghurt added that little bit of je ne sais quoi!

Ingredients for two:

- 300g shoulder of pork, cubed
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 each red and yellow pepper, cubed
- 2 short sticks celery, finely sliced
- Olive oil
- 1 tbsp tomato purée
- 1/2 tbsp paprika
- 1 tin chopped tomatoes
- 400ml stock
- 1 bay leaf
- Salt and pepper

Heat the oil in a smallish soup pot and brown the meat in batches. Reserve. Throw in the vegetables and cook them for a couple of minutes until they take a little colour. Return the meat to the pot.

Add the tomato purée and bay leaf, stir and, once the purée is evenly distributed, add the paprika and chopped tomatoes. Stir, add the stock and bring to the boil.

Cover, and let it simmer for a couple of hours until the meat is very tender.

Serve with Greek yoghurt and warm bread.



Living with Multiple Food Allergies or Intolerances

Shellfish. Peanut. Soy. Lactose. Gluten. Corn. We've heard of all of them and then some, right? If you are someone who faces any or multiple of these food allergies or intolerance issues, it can make everyday life quite challenging.

There is often a deep sense of loss when lifelong favourite foods or restaurants are suddenly off-limits. It can be more difficult for adults to accept the food substitutions since, unlike children, newly diagnosed adults remember what certain foods are supposed to taste like. For example, gluten-free pretzels or brownies might not taste bad, but if you spent your whole life having the gluten version, you're probably going to notice the difference.

What's the difference between a food allergy and food intolerance?

A food allergy is an immune system response to a food protein that triggers an allergic reaction in the body. Symptoms can include hives, itching, swelling, vomiting, diarrhoea and nausea. In some cases, it can cause potentially life-threatening symptoms, either by breathing difficulties (anaphylaxis) or a sudden drop in blood pressure.

Recent studies have found bloating, diarrhoea, nausea, indigestion, aggravation of eczema and/ that 40 to 50 percent of eczema cases in young children are triggered or asthma. Food intolerances can sometimes mimic symptoms of by food allergies. There are eight foods that cause 90 percent of other medical conditions. Most of the suggestions in this article are allergies: milk, egg, peanuts, tree nuts, fish, shellfish, wheat, and geared towards food allergies, but it doesn't hurt to practice some of soy. 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

Whether you're dealing with an allergy or an intolerance, read on for a few tips to make the early weeks of life with a newly restricted diet more manageable.

Confirm the Diagnosis

If you have unmistakable food allergy symptoms after eating a certain food, you may be tempted to just not eat that food and avoid the time, expense, and hassle of allergy testing. This is what most do people do nowadays.

Vegan, gluten-free and dairy-free diets are trendy, especially on social media. Being trendy can be fun, but it's not always the best idea when it comes to what foods your body may or may not be able to tolerate.

Symptoms you attribute to what you believe is a dairy allergy may be the more easily treatable lactose intolerance. You might have an allergy to what a food was cooked in or a chemical added to a processed item and not the food itself. That's why it's so important to be tested. You can ask your primary care physician for a recommendation.

Time for a Pantry Cleanup

Clear every item you can't eat from your pantry, refrigerator, and freezer. Why? No sense in keeping them around as unnecessary temptation! It's also a way to avoid cross-contamination.

Be sure to check your cosmetics and toiletries for potentially allergenic ingredients, too, especially if they go near your eyes, hands or mouth.

If you live with roommates or family who eat things you can't, it's ideal to separate your food storage and prep areas and possibly keep some separate cookware and utensils for yourself.





Play with Recipes

You won't necessarily have to give up your favourite recipes when you're diagnosed with an allergy as an adult, but you will need to make substitutions to take advantage of cookbooks and recipes that aren't specifically written for those with food allergies. Focus on learning substitutions for the most common ingredients you have to avoid in the kitchen. There are tons of non-gluten flours, egg substitutions and alternative milks out there nowadays. Create a stash of dependable allergen-free recipes for yourself.

Restaurants Are Not Off-Limits

Eating at restaurants soon after an allergy diagnosis can feel discouraging, so start slow. Depending on where you live, it may be easier or more difficult to find restaurants that will make substitutions or have options that will work for you. Stick to one or two restaurants where the chefs or owners are approachable and accommodating and expand from there. Some chain restaurants actually list the food allergens and additives their dishes may contain, which is also helpful.

Practice Managing Your Stress Levels

It's perfectly normal to feel stressed as you transition into this new lifestyle. There are studies of people living with food allergies that consistently show that they have high levels of stress.

If this diagnosis makes you feel overwhelmed, do whatever possible to simplify other aspects of your life for a while. Find compassionate friends to talk to. Start an exercise or meditation program. Even seeing a professional to talk about your frustrations can positively enhance your overall mental health and wellbeing.

Whether you have a food allergy or a food intolerance, you can take small actionable steps, like the ones mentioned above, towards maintaining a healthy and happy lifestyle!













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Jason's Meat Free Recipe: **Chickpea Burgers**

These have a long and lovely history for me, prompting many fond memories (the 'incredible, but almost-inedibles', for example, when there was a slight slip on the spicing, creating an inferno), but ones that were always delicious.

This version is spicy and tasty, but without the burn. Should you wish to recreate that of course, just be generous with additional chilli.

I made these two ways - with and without a burger bun. They're both equally good, although without is a bit healthier. It looks like a lot of ingredients but it's all store cupboard stuff or is easily available.

If wanting to stay vegan swap out the butter for coconut oil, the Greek yoghurt for vegan yoghurt and miss the egg out entirely. The flour will still stick to the burger!

Ingredients - makes 4 burgers

1 large Jar of cooked chickpeas - drained

- 3 tbsp chickpea/garbanzo flour
- 3 tbps Greek yogurt
- 1 small red or brown onion finely chopped
- 1 medium red pepper finely chopped
- 2 small fresh red/green chillies, deseeded and chopped (can add more to taste)
- 2-3 cloves of garlic finely chopped/grated
- Zest and juice of $\frac{1}{2}$ a lemon
- 50g butter
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 pack fresh coriander
- 1tsp cumin seeds, toasted (ground also works)
- 1 tsp coriander seeds, toasted (ditto)
- 1tsp turmeric
- Salt and pepper to taste

If using coriander and cumin seeds dry roast them in a frying pan, keeping them moving, until they're aromatic. Then take off the heat and crush in a pestle and mortar.

Beat the egg in a shallow bowl and put the flour into a separate shallow bowl.

Using the same frying pan, add the chopped onion and pepper, and stir over a medium heat until there are the fist signs of browning, add the spices, chillies and garlic and stir for a minute or so. Remove from the heat.



Tip the drained chickpeas into a food processor (if you don't have one then into a bowl and roughly mash them) with ²/₃ of the coriander, and stalks from the remaining $\frac{1}{3}$. Keep those leaves for the salsa.

Blend it a bit, but not too much. You don't want hummus, something coarser

Tip into a bowl and stir in the sauteed onions etc, the lemon juice, zest and yoghurt. Mix it and add some salt and pepper to taste.

Shape into burgers (you can go big or small, and any spare can be frozen.

Dip the burger in the egg on both sides and then dredge through the chickpea flour to lightly coat.

Fry them in some olive or other vegetable oil on a medium high heat for a couple of minutes each side or until they are golden brown and serve.

As above they go well in a bun with the usual burger trimmings or on their own with the salsa and a dollop of the yoghurt.

For the salsa, if you choose to make it, soak half a sliced red onion in cider vinegar (or lemon juice) for an hour or so, just to take the sharpness off the onion, then drain and pat dry with kitchen paper. Mix together with the set aside coriander leaves.

At long last our local towns have been blessed with the brown organic waste bins. I say 'at long last' because many cities around Spain have had them for over 18 months.


Not many people seem to be using the bins. Maybe it is because we are uncertain about what to put in the bin and more importantly what do you put the waste in before dropping into the bin.

2. What waste should be deposited in a brown container?

Food waste (fruit, vegetables, meat, fish)

3. What waste should not be deposited in a brown container?

The following should not be deposited in a brown container:

- Plastics
- Glass
- Metals
- Paper and cardboard
- Diapers and personal hygiene products
- Hazardous waste (batteries, chemicals)

4. Why is it important to use a brown container?

Using the brown bin is important because it allows for the separation and recycling of organic waste, which helps to:

Reduce the amount of rubbish that goes to landfills.

Reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Produce high-quality compost to improve soil fertility.

Generate biogas as a renewable energy source.

5. How should I prepare organic waste before placing it in the brown container?

Organic waste should be free of plastics and other non-biodegradable materials. You can use compostable bags for its collection and, if possible, chop up food scraps to facilitate decomposition.

6. What happens to waste placed in the brown container?

Waste placed in the brown container is transported to composting or anaerobic digestion plants. There, it undergoes controlled decomposition processes to be transformed into compost or biogas.

7. What environmental benefits does composting organic waste have?

Composting organic waste offers several environmental benefits:

- It improves soil quality by adding organic matter and nutrients. It reduces the need for chemical fertilizers.
- It helps retain soil moisture, reducing water consumption. It reduces methane emissions from landfills.

8. Can I put animal waste in the brown container?

Yes, you can put animal waste, such as meat and fish, in the brown container, as long as it does not contain large amounts of fat or very large bones, as these can hinder the composting process.

In the Pink!

Our animal this month is the flamingo, an elegant and easily identified creature with its long legs, neck and wings, beautiful colours, and distinctive beak. The flamingo measures between 1.2 and 1.5 metres.

The male is somewhat larger than the female, and his neck is longer.

Flamingos are gregarious animals, and they live in flocks which can amount to thousands. A flock of flamingos is called a flamboyance. Like humans, flamingos make friends for life.

The plumage is reddish white mixed with orange or pink. The flamingo owes its Latin name (Phoenicopterus roseus) to its colouring. When the flamingo spreads its wings, it shows off an intense red contrasting with black.

The red and pink colouring is due to the carotenoids that are found in the

microscopic algae that brine shrimps – part of the flamingo's staple diet – eat.

The flamingo is a filter feeder. Its characteristic beak has evolved to filtrate animals and vegetable matter which pass through its specialised mandibles, very much in the same way a baleen whale does.

Its call is a repeated two-tone sound, not unlike that of geese.

Flamingos live in quiet saltwater lagoons and estuaries, close to the coast where the water is not too deep.

They are present all year round in Spain in Doñana, Malaga, Alicante, Murcia, and the Ebro Delta. They also visit the Balearics in winter.

They breed in colonies and make nests of mud close to their foraging ground.

The mating season spreads over several months. The birds mate any time between April and July and the female lays one single egg about 24 days later only once a year – unless something went wrong with the first egg, then she can lay another. The incubation takes a month, and both male and female sit on the egg.

Once the chick has hatched it leaves the nest after 2-3 days. It is constantly looked after by one of the adults until it's seven to ten days old.







The next step is to go into the kindergarten which holds any number of young flamingos looked after by a flock of adults, all the parents take turns. The parents also come back to feed their chick at intervals.

Flamingos usually stand on one leg with the other tucked beneath the body. The reason for this behaviour is not fully understood. One theory is that standing on one leg allows the birds to conserve more body heat, given that they spend a significant amount of time wading in cold water.

Having said that, flamingos that live in warm water areas also stand on one leg.

Flamingos sleep standing up.

Their life expectancy is 20 to 30 years, and in captivity they can live to be 50.

After all, life was for living, and they had a lot of dancing to do.



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



The EU has also funded research into the impact that light pollution has on pollinating insects (the Pollinators Initiative) and discovered that it does negatively affect them.

For bird species exhaustion has become a factor and a factor in lower broods. In particularly bright spots in town and cities, there is no darkness, and so no respite. Taken together this sort of disruption to haviour causes observable changes in ecosystems. It interrupts the dynamic between prey and predator and thereby affects the balance between species. There are also noticeable impacts on plants through subtle changes to their growth cycles.

The amount and type of lighting can make a significant difference too.

Badly designed street lighting or uplighting wastes a lot of energy unnecessarily. Of course, we don't want to be stumbling around in the pitch black, but low saturation lighting, that does the job of lighting one's way efficiently, is a means to cut energy use, cost and greenhouse gas emissions.

Downward facing lighting, or that which is shielded in some way can avoid the 'skyglow' effect that is seen in the airspace over population centres and cut the amount of potentially dazzling glare. Within the EU there is no specific law relating to light pollution, although the Zero Pollution Action Plan, adopted in 2021 as part of



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the European Green Deal programme, identifies light pollution as 'a pollutant of emerging concern'. Watch this, preferably dimly-lit, space.

Spanish authorities have acted to curb light pollution through both national and regional legislation, reflecting a commitment to mitigating its environmental, cultural and health impacts.

At national level, Spain has incorporated provisions related to light pollution within broader environmental laws (just as has happened in the UK where light pollution can amount to a statutory nuisance). Law 34/2007 is mostly concerned with air pollution, although it has a separate additional provision specifically targeted towards minimising light pollution by the

promotion of efficiency measures. Otherwise, Spain's Autonomous Community system of regional government has seen certain Communities enact specific laws to tackle light pollution.

Catalonia's law is related to the planning system and is targeted towards the regulation of both exterior and interior lighting installations, in other words it is seeking to cut off the problem at source by urban design. Cantabria's and Navarra's, attempts, in 2006 and 2022 respectively, have their basis in energy efficiency but also refer specifically to the need to reduce the polluting element of artificial lighting.

Finally, the Canary Islands enacted the "Law of the Sky" (Law 31/1988) in the 1980's. Some of the World's great astronomical observatories are situated there, and to ensure that they continue to be effective and unaffected by artificial ambient light, the law places limits on outdoor lighting in order to preserve and ensure dark skies.

January and February this year see a number of alignments of the visible planets (look east after sundown away from ambient light to have the best chance of seeing them). The one on February 28th won't happen again for another 400-plus years. Happy stargazing.

Signing off, on the sunset of the inauguration of the 47th president of the USA, I'm drawn to the phrase "may we live in less interesting times". If even half of his administration's planned environmental 'roll-backs' are made effective, a bit of light pollution, as challenging to some as that may be, will rank amongst the least of the planet's problems.



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
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The Almost Miraculous Benefits Of Frangipani



It is also used in preventing the occurrence of fainting due to excessive heat, in treating constipation, in addressing the irregular discharge of urine and in obtaining an adequate amount of high quality sleep. Its flowers are known to be effective in stopping coughs, regulating the shed of urine and in lowering the temperature. Meanwhile, its trunk contains compounds that are useful in regulating bowel movements.

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When frangipani flowers are cooked, it creates a savoury flavour which brings about a number of health benefits and therapeutic effects to the body. Frangipani contains chemicals that make an excellent toothache drug. Some of its chemical contents are even capable of relieving cracking and swelling on soles. It can even be used to treat ulcers and when taken as tea, it creates a cooling effect which is good for digestion. Some cultures use frangipani to heal sexually transmitted diseases such as gonorrhoea.

For centuries, frangipani is widely used in Indian societies because of its healing benefits. Its floral scent is used in aromatherapy as it helps in rejuvenating the mind and body of an individual. The inhalation of the scent promotes deep internal cleansing which





refreshes the soul, body and mind of an individual. Aside from its relaxing and de-stressing effects, frangipani is also known to create a calming, spiritual and soothing atmosphere.

It is used in aromatherapy because of its heavy, sweet and green aroma that is found to be alluring and sensual. Its seductive and long lasting fragrance makes it one of the main ingredients in a number of gels, hair packs, conditioners and shampoos.

Aside from its magnificent scent, frangipani is highly regarded for its amazing benefits to the skin and hair. Frangipani can also be used in cosmetics, massage oil, bath and beauty products as it serves as a perfect skin care

> because of its age defying effects. It helps in revitalizing the skin and hair and gives optimum moisture. It is easily absorbed by the skin thereby making the skin healthier, smoother and softer. It also provides protection against the harmful UV-rays of the sun.

> It is even used in terminal care because it creates inner peace and self-awareness as well as in reducing the patient's stress and reviving their spirit. Furthermore, it creates an aromatic environment that is found to be

relaxing, soothing, invigorating and energizing.

Frangipani is sometimes used as an ingredient in lotions and creams because of its antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. In fact, it is featured in many ointments and concoctions due to its antiinflammatory properties which are effective in relieving back pain, headache, tinnitus and inflammation.

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Spain's Working Dogs

They help track down people who have disappeared, they travel to scenes of natural disasters to help sniff out victims, they mark the place where someone is buried under the snow.

Spain's working dogs do this and much more thanks to their welldeveloped sense of smell, their personality, specialist training, and a desire to work and to please.

These rescue dogs can save our lives. Let's have a look at what characterises these furry heroes.

Any breed of dog can be used for rescue work. However, they must have certain traits that make them better equipped for the job.

The kind of dogs that are sought after are playful animals who love to have fun with their toys (the toy is the motivator and reward for working), who have a good hunting instinct (again, for fun, not aggressive), a good sense of smell, as well as the will to work. They must also be very sociable and be able to work without distraction when surrounded by lots of people.

It is a known fact that dogs have great connection and empathy with man and that they can perceive pain and unhappiness. This motivates them even more to rescue people who are suffering. Again, basic socialisation is a must, both for the training period and also once they work in places with throngs of people and other dogs.

Rescue dogs must also be impervious to loud noises such as explosions, earthquakes, volcano eruptions, etc., and never be put off working and playing by anything in their immediate surroundings.

The most common breeds used in rescue work are Belgian Malinois, German Shepherd and some retrievers, such as Labrador and Golden Retriever. These are animals who have the necessary characteristic in their genes and the potential for reinforcing these genes to turn them into good rescue dogs.

Of course, Saint Bernard and Newfoundland dogs are also known as rescue dogs in specific situations, especially in mountainous and snowy regions.

Any other breed can perfectly well become rescue dogs and save lives, the only basic requirement is that they have the special characteristics required for the job.

And of course, whether or not the dog is a breed that is genetically predisposed for the job, they all need thorough training. From about one year of age, a dog with the right characteristics can start his training, although some are ready earlier, and others may need a bit more time before they are receptive to education.

Training continues throughout the working life of the dog, and he is always accompanied by a handler whom he recognises as his leader. It usually takes one or two years of intense training, both emotional, physical, and to a high standard of discipline – and the training is always done through play.

During training the dog learns to associate finding a victim with a reward (getting to play with his toy), which makes him do his very best to succeed; and eventually the very accomplishment of his task becomes a reward in itself.

Continuous training is essential, as is the exposure to different situations and environments: Landslides, debris, burnt down, aquatic, and subterranean areas amongst others.


During the whole process the training team works in close collaboration with veterinarians who make sure the dogs are well,

both physically and emotionally, that they enjoy what they are doing, that they do not get wounded, and generally that they are in optimal health.

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Although for a rescue dog working is playing, these brave animals carry out a very hard job with great physical and emotional demands, so they are usually retired between the ages of seven and ten, in accordance with the toll the work has taken on them over the years.

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The Parrot Ravachol

Parrots are obviously well known for their chatty nature, and even those that cannot talk human certainly like the sound of their own voices

But in Pontevedra in Galicia, at the beginning of the last century, there was a parrot who was so chatty and spot on with his remarks and observations that he became famous all over Spain, and his fame even reached other countries and continents, and it is considered that even today, over 100 years after his death, he is the world's most famous parrot.

His name was Ravachol.

He was the pet of the pharmacist Perfecto Feijóo. Ravachol's charisma and cheek turned him into a symbol of the city of Pontevedra.

When he died, he was given a loving send-off by the townsfolk, attended by large crowds.

In 1891 Perfecto Feijóo was given the exotic animal by his friend Martín Fayes, the conductor of the military band of the Guillarei-Tui infantry regiment.

The parrot took a while to settle into his new home. But once he did, he revealed his true character and surprised both his family and strangers with the troublemaking and irreverent character he carried within.

It is not known whether the parrot was given a name when he first came to Pontevedra, but before a year had passed after his arrival to the city he was known to all the inhabitants by the name of a famous French revolutionary. François Ravachol was an anarchist who, apart from his troublemaker tendencies became famous as a much feared terrorist after he had attacked several targets with dynamite. It was Don Perfecto himself that named the parrot Ravachol because of his rebellious and rambunctious character.

This loveable animal soon learned to identify in which situations to use what phrases, almost always in Gallego, which soon became common sayings amongst the citizens of Pontevedra. Don Perfecto tried in vain to correct the parrot's bad behaviour and threatening manner

When somebody teased him he'd say 'Se collo a vara' (I'll get the stick out).

People who tried to give him sweets were met with the phrase 'Vaite de ahí lambón' (get out of here, bootlicker!)

If the pharmacy was empty and somebody entered he would shout 'Don Perfecto, parroquia' (Don Perfecto, clients!) or 'Xente na tenda' (people in the shop).

If somebody with an unfortunate appearance entered the shop he'd proclaim 'Aquí no se fía' (we don't give credit).





Moreover, if a priest entered he'd make the sounds of a crow, and when there was mass in the nearby Santuario de la Peregrina, he'd say prayers and sing hymns and generally bother the faithful, whom he called 'barbarians'.

He was also said to hit the nail on the head with some of the insults he directed at several famous people, intellectuals and powerful politicians of the era.

But on 26th January 1913 Ravachol died. He is said to have died from indigestion after eating biscuits soaked in wine. The people of Pontevedra were so saddened and pained by the passing of the city's most emblematic character that his body was embalmed and exhibited in the pharmacy. Don Perfecto

received sympathy telegrams from all over Spain.

So many people came to pay their last respects to Ravachol that the pharmacy soon proved too small, and the local tradesman's guild installed his body in a mortuary chapel. The whole city filed past, including civil authority and military figures; the whole district was shaken.

The funeral of Ravachol was set to 5th February, Ash Wednesday, and the tradesman's guild organised the service. Notices were put up all over the city inviting everybody to attend, each dressed up as they wished and carried a funeral lantern. The procession was headed by twelve men on horseback and amongst the thousands of mourners were musical bands, troupes and floats. In front of a crowded grandstand the parrot was sent off to the sounds of 'Unlucky Soirée', a local funeral song.

Everybody from the top of society to the lowliest citizens participated in this last goodbye to their beloved Ravachol the Parrot.

In 1985, a group of enterprising citizens and the municipal fiesta commission decided to recreate the funeral of Ravachol the Parrot during the city's carnival.

This first recreation of the funeral of Ravachol was a resounding success and it has since then become one of the most popular acts of many Spanish carnivals, and it is the final act of the extremely lively Pontevedra carnival week.

And Ravachol the Parrot can now even boast dances dedicated to him as well as his own pins and other merchandising.

Moreover, there is a sculpture representing him in the street where the pharmacy used to be, just a stone's throw from the Santuario de la Peregrina, whose worshippers he used to make fun of.



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The hidden story of a true F1 great **By Dan Ripley**

When speaking to Formula 1 fans, there are a number of legends of the sport they'll name, no matter what they came in at.

The more modern fans might lean towards Max Verstappen or Lewis Hamilton, and the more seasoned veterans might lean to Michael Schumacher, Ayrton Senna and Alain Prost - even Juan Manuel Fangio - but everyone's got their legends.

Sometimes though there are names that get lost over time as new generations of supporters come along, one of those is David Purley.

Purley had the talent to establish himself as an F1 driver, but he is never remembered much for his results as he only ever finished four races. Among those he is officially classed as 'DNF' is the 1973 Dutch Grand Prix at Zandvoort which was just his second ever race start.

What the British driver did that day was something that was greater than just being an F1 racer, it marked him out as a remarkable human being in an era when driving an F1 car was a life-threatening experience to unthinkable levels compared to today, that has thankfully seen drivers' safety reach greater levels since, even if the

full dangers are unlikely to ever disappear.



How Purley tried to save Roger Williamson

On lap eight of the race Roger Williamson crashed, pitching him upside down near a barrier with his car on fire. The race continued with just a yellow flag to cover events.

Purley though, having seen the crash and realising the seriousness of the situation, parked his car, leapt out and ran across the track sprinting to the incident to try and overturn Williamson's car and pull him to safety.

Sadly, track marshals very nearby did not have fire overalls on and whether due to the heat, or acting in shock, could only watch Purley's desperate one-man attempt to save Williamson's life.

Purley wrestled a fire extinguisher from a marshal to try and put the flame out, but it proved no use. No other driver stopped, thinking it was just Purley attending to his own car. Race control believed the

same thing, thus the race continued.

The Dutch spectators also tried to help but had the same problem as the marshals in trying to get beyond the intense heat of the fire without proper overalls.

Tragically, Purley could not put out the fire, nor overturn the car and his total visible devastation that his actions could not save the life of Williamson before he was reluctantly led away by a marshal were all caught on camera. It's a very difficult piece of footage to watch.

It took the fire engine eight minutes to get to the scene, navigating race traffic, but by the time it got to Williamson - the British driver had already died of asphyxiation.

Purley's extraordinary bravery on that day led to him being awarded the George Medal by the United Kingdom. He later died in 1985 in a plane crash having previously taken up aerobatics.

On what would have been his 80th birthday on Sunday 26th January, it's a timely reminder that we should never forget Purley's act of astonishing bravery at Zandvoort that as a human alone puts him up among Formula 1 greats.



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



2025 Race of Champions

Sebastian Vettel is set to return to racing alongside fellow German Mick Schumacher at the 2025 Race of Champions (ROC)

The two former Formula 1 drivers will race together for Germany in the ROC Nations Cup, set to be held in Sydney on March 7-8.

It will mark the four-time world champion's return to a country in which he claimed three of his 53 grands prix victories.

The 2025 ROC will be the first time this prestigious event has ever been hosted in the Southern Hemisphere, with the action taking place at Sydney's Olympic Stadium.

Vettel and Schumacher are headlining what promises to be a star-studded lineup of motorsport legends, competing in identical cars on ROC's iconic 950-metre parallel track, where pure driving skill will determine the winner.

The ROC, renowned for assembling a who's who of motorsport across disciplines like F1, Le Mans, and Nascar, will pit drivers from various racing series against each other in a test of raw talent.

Competitors will race in identical machinery, meaning no team advantages or technical tweaks - just pure driving prowess.

The ROC Nations Cup will see Vettel and Schumacher represent Germany, while Saturday will focus on individual glory, with drivers vying for the title of 'Champion of Champions.'



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Vettel, who won the individual ROC in London in 2015 and the Nations Cup title six times alongside Michael Schumacher, is eager to team up with Mick Schumacher once again.

The pair last competed together in 2019, finishing second in the Nations Cup.

"I'm delighted to be coming back to the Race Of Champions and teaming up with Mick again," Vettel said in a statement.

"Sydney is a fantastic venue, and I'm excited for the chance to race in front of Australian fans once more."

25-year-old Schumacher, who currently races in the World Endurance Championship and serves as Mercedes' reserve driver in F1, is equally enthusiastic.


"I look forward to representing Germany with Seb, and of course, we're going for the win in both the Nations Cup and individual events." Schumacher said.


The ROC 2025 is set to provide a spectacular precursor to a packed motorsport calendar.


It will take place just a week before the opening round of the 2025 F1 world championship in Melbourne, and two weeks after the Supercars season opener in Sydney.



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
